"What is this thing that you do with the people? Why do you sit by yourself alone, and why do all the people stand by you from morning to evening?"


And Moses said to his father-inlaw: "The people come to me to inquire of God. When they have a matter, they come to me, and I make them know the statutes of God, and his laws."

# THE TEN COMMANDMENTS



N the third month after the children of Israel had left Egypt, they came into the

desert of Sinai. They pitched their tents in the wilderness and camped there before the mountain.

Moses went up to talk to the Lord, and God called to him from the mountain, saying:

"Say to the children of Israel, 'You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I carried you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself. Now if you will obey my voice and keep your agreement with me, then you shall be a special treasure to me, more than any other people. You shall be a kingdom of priests to me, and a holy nation.' These are the words you shall speak to the children of Israel."

Moses came down and called for the elders of the people, and laid before them all the words of the Lord. And the people answered together and said:

"All that the Lord has spoken, we will do."

Then Moses told the Lord what the people had said. And God was pleased and spoke to Moses, saying: "Lo, I will come to you in a thick cloud, so that the people may hear when I speak to you, and believe you forever.

"Now go to the people and bless them today and tomorrow. Have them wash their clothes and be ready for the third day. For the third day the Lord will come down in the sight of all the people upon Mount Sinai. You shall set bounds for the people, and warn them to take care not to go up on the mountain or touch the side of it, for whoever touches the mountain shall surely be put to death. Anyone who does touch it shall be stoned or shot, whether it be beast or man. When the trumpet sounds a long blast, they shall come up to the mountain."

Moses went down from the mountain to the people, and he blessed them, and they washed their clothes. And he said to them:

"Be ready for the third day."

When the third day came, in the morning there was thunder and lightning, and a thick cloud lay upon the mountain. Then the voice of a trumpet sounded so loud that all the people in the camp trembled.

And Moses led the people out of the camp to meet with God, and they stood at the foot of the mountain.

Mount Sinai was covered with smoke, because the Lord descended on it in fire. The smoke rose up like the smoke of a furnace, and the whole mountain trembled and shook.

When the voice of the trumpet sounded long blasts, and grew louder and louder, Moses spoke, and God answered him by a voice. Then the Lord came down upon the top of Mount Sinai, and he called Moses up to the top of the mountain, and Moses went up.

And God spoke all these words, saying:

"I am the Lord your God, who



brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.

"You shall have no gods other than me.

"You shall not make any sculptured image or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or on the earth beneath, or in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them nor worship them. For I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, punishing the offspring of those who hate me, and showing mercy to thousands of those that love me and keep my commandments.

"You shall not use the name of the Lord your God carelessly.

"Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord your God. In it you shall do no work, you, nor any member of your family and household, nor any person living with you. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore the Lord blessed the seventh day and made it holy.

"Respect your father and your mother, so that your days may be many in the land the Lord your God gives to you.

"You shall not kill.

"You shall not commit adultery.

"You shall not steal.


"You shall not wrongly accuse your neighbour.

"You shall not envy your neighbour, nor desire to have his house, his wife, his servants, his animals, nor anything that is his."

All the people saw the thunder and lightning and heard the noise of the trumpet and saw the mountain smoke. And when they did so, they moved

back and stood at a distance. And they said to Moses:

"Speak to us, and we will listen.



But do not let God speak to us, for fear that we may die."

And Moses said to the people:

"Do not fear, for God has come to test you, so that you may learn to have respect for him, so that you may do no wrong."

The people stood far off while Moses drew near to the thick darkness where the Lord was.

#### LAWS FOR GOVERNING THE TRIBES

And God spoke to Moses and gave him laws to govern the tribes of Israel in all their acts. And among the laws that were given were the following:

"Anyone who strikes another man and kills him must himself be put to death.

"Anyone who strikes his father or his mother shall be put to death.

"Anyone who kidnaps another, and sells him or keeps him as a slave shall be put to death.

"Anyone who curses his father or his mother shall be put to death.

"Life shall be given for life, an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, burning for burning, wound for wound.

"But if a thief is killed by a person who attacks him in the act of stealing, that person shall not be punished for murder.

"If an ox gores a man or woman, and they die, then the ox shall be stoned and he shall not be eaten, but the owner of the ox shall not be charged. But if the ox was accustomed to push with his horn in time past and it has been made known to his owner and he has not kept him in, the ox shall be stoned and the owner also shall be put to death.

"If a man steals an ox or a sheep and kills it or sells it, he shall restore five oxen for an ox and four sheep for a sheep. If the animal is found in his hand alive, whether it is ox or ass or sheep, he shall restore double.

"Any man who worships any god other than the Lord shall be des-

troyed.

"You shall deal kindly with strangers, for you were strangers in the

land of Egypt.

"You shall care for the widow and the fatherless child. If you hurt them, and they cry to the Lord, their cry shall be heard. The Lord's anger shall be great, and he will cause your own death, so that your wives shall be widows and your children fatherless.

"If you lend money to any of my people who are poor, you shall not take interest on the sum owed to you.

"You shall obey without complaint the ruler and the judges of the people."

#### THE ARK OF THE COVENANT

Moses came down and told the people all the words of the Lord and all his laws, and the people said:

"Everything the Lord has said, we

will do."


Moses wrote down all the words of the Lord, and he arose early in the morning and built an altar to the Lord, with twelve pillars for the twelve tribes of Israel, and he sacrificed to the Lord.


Then Moses and Aaron and seventy of the elders of Israel rose up, and they saw the Lord of Israel. And God said to Moses:

"Come up to me in the mountain, and I will give you tablets of stone with the law and the commandments which I have written, so that you may teach them."

Moses and his minister Joshua rose up and before he went into the mountain of God, Moses said to the elders:

"Wait here for us. Aaron and Hur are with you: if any man has any





dispute to settle, let him go to them."

When Moses went to the mountain, a cloud covered it. The glory of the Lord was over Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days. On the seventh day God called to Moses from the cloud, and the sight of the glory of the Lord was like a raging fire on the top of the mountain, to the eves of the children of Israel.

Moses went into the cloud and up the mountain, and he was on the mountain for forty days and forty nights.

And God spoke to Moses, saying:

"Tell the people of Israel to bring me offerings. From every man who gives

willingly with his heart you shall take the offering. And this is what you will receive from them: gold, silver and brass, cloths of blue, purple and scarlet, fine linen, goats' hair, rams' skins dyed red, badgers' skins and acacia wood, oil for lighting, spices for anointing and for sweet incense, onyx stones and other iewels.

"And let them make me a sanctuary so that I may live among them. They shall make it according to all that I tell you.

"They shall make me an ark of acacia wood. It shall be a chest four feet long, two feet wide and two feet high. It is to be covered with gold





inside and out, and it shall have a gold band around it. At each corner it shall have a gold ring, and through these rings shall be passed gold-covered rods of acacia wood, so that the ark may be carried.

"These rods shall remain in the rings of the ark and shall not be taken from it. And they shall put in the ark the laws I shall give you.

"They shall make also a mercy seat, a throne of pure gold, four feet long and two feet wide. At each end of the mercy seat there shall be the figure of an angel in beaten gold. And the angels shall stretch their wings upward, covering the mercy seat with them. Their faces shall look to one another and shall be inclined slightly downwards. And the mercy seat shall be put upon the ark, and in the ark shall be put the law and the commandments that I shall give you.

"And there I will meet with you, and

speak to you from above the mercy seat, from between the two angels upon the ark.

"And they shall make a table of acacia wood, and cover it with gold, and put a gold band around it with gold rings at each corner. And goldcovered rods of acacia wood shall be passed through the rings, so that the table may be carried.

"And they shall make a candlestick of pure gold. Of beaten work shall the candlestick be made. Its shaft and its branches, its bowls and its flowers shall be of the same. And six branches shall come out of the sides of it, three branches out of one side, and three out of the other side. It shall all be one beaten work of pure gold. And there shall be seven lamps like this. And the tongs and the snuffers thereof shall be of pure gold. See that they are made after the pattern showed on the mountain.

"And they shall make a tabernacle, a tent lined with fine linen and with blue, purple and scarlet cloth, and covered with goats' hair cloth, rams' skins dyed red and badgers' skins.

"And the ark of the testimony, with the mercy seat upon it, shall be kept in the tabernacle and covered with a veil, a curtain of blue, purple and scarlet cloth. In front of the veil shall be kept the table. On the table shall be set showbread, twelve loaves of sacred bread shall be set there every sabbath, to be eaten by the priests.

"And the people of Israel shall

ments to consecrate him. And these are the garments which they shall make: a breastplate, an ephod, a robe, an embroidered coat, a turban and a girdle.

"And they shall make the ephod of gold, of blue, of purple, of scarlet and fine twined linen, with skilful work. And they shall make for the breastplate chains of pure gold. And Aaron shall bear the names of the children of Israel on the breastplate of judgment upon his heart when he goes into the holy place, as a memorial before the Lord.

"And they shall make the robe all



make an altar, and set it up before the tabernacle.

"Take Aaron your brother and his sons with him from among the children of Israel, that he may minister to me in the priest's office. And you shall make holy garments for Aaron your brother, for glory and for beauty. You shall speak to all that are wisehearted, whom I have filled with the spirit of wisdom, that they make Aaron's garof blue, and beneath, on the hem of it, you shall make pomegranates of blue, and of purple and of scarlet, with bells of gold between them. Aaron shall wear these garments when he ministers so that his sound may be heard both when he goes in to worship before the Lord, and when he comes out. And you shall make a plate of pure gold, and engrave upon it in the manner of a signet, HOLINESS TO THE LORD. You shall put it on the front of the turban and it shall be attached with a lace of blue.

"This plate shall be at all times upon Aaron's forehead as a token of his ministry in order that the holy offerings of the people of Israel may be acceptable before the Lord.

"Aaron and his sons shall be anointed with oil and shall be made priests, so that they may make sacrifices to me for

the people.

"And for the sacrifice you shall take one young bullock and two lambs without blemish, unleavened bread, unleavened cakes tempered with oil, and unleavened wafers anointed with oil. You shall make them of wheat flour, and place them in a basket, bringing it with the bullock and the two rams.

"Then you shall bring Aaron and his sons to the door of the tabernacle of the congregation and wash them with water.

"All these things shall be possible because I have given you men of skill and intelligence, whom I have filled with the spirit of God. These men are craftsmen of great experience and understanding. They are able to work in gold, silver and brass, to cut and set stones and to carve timber. They have the talent to make all that I have commanded, whether the tabernacle of the congregation, the ark of the testimony or the mercy seat upon it.

"Speak to the people of Israel and say: 'You shall keep my sabbaths as a sign between me and you through all generations. Six days may work be done but the seventh is a day of rest, holy to the Lord, for having made heaven and earth in six days, the Lord rested on the seventh."

And when God had finished speaking to Moses upon Mount Sinai, he gave him two tablets of stone, the tablets of the law and commandments, written by the hand of the Lord.

"Let this be your god, O Israel, which brought you up out of the land of Egypt," they said.


When Aaron saw it, he built an altar before it. Then he made a proclamation,

He took the calf which they had made and burned it in the fire, and ground it to powder and sprinkled it upon the water, and made the people of Israel drink it.


And Moses said to Aaron:


"What did the people do to you that made you lead them into such great wrongdoing?"


"Do not be angry," Aaron said.



"You must keep all my commandments and worship me according to my laws."

Moses was with the Lord forty days and forty nights. During this time he did not eat or drink, and he wrote upon the tablets the words of the law and the ten commandments.

And when Moses came down from Mount Sinai with the two tablets in his hand, he did not know that the skin of his face shone after his encounter with God. And when Aaron and the children of Israel saw Moses, they were afraid to come near him because his face shone. Moses called to them, and Aaron and all the rulers of the congregation came to him, and Moses talked with them.

Afterwards, all the children of Israel came, and Moses told them all that the



Lord had said to him on Mount Sinai.

"Who shall give us food to eat? We remember the fish which we did eat freely in Egypt. We remember the cucumbers and the melons, the leeks, the onions and the garlic. But now there is nothing but this manna for us to eat."

Moses heard the people's cries, and the anger of the Lord was greatly kindled. Moses also was displeased, and he said to the Lord:

"Why have you laid the burden of this people upon me, to bring them to the land which you promised to their fathers? Where will I find food to give to all of them? For they are weeping and saying to me, 'Give us food to eat.' I cannot bear this burden alone. I pray you to kill me and save me from my misery."

And God said:

"Gather seventy men of the elders of Israel, and bring them to the tabernacle to stand there with you. I will come down and talk with you there, and I will make them share the burden of the people, so that you no longer bear it alone.

"And say to the people, 'You shall eat meat, not for one day, nor two

days, nor five days, nor ten days, nor twenty days, but for a whole month, until you are bursting with it and begin to hate it."

Moses answered the Lord, saying:

"The people number six hundred thousand, and you have said you will give them meat to eat for a whole month. Shall the flocks be slaughtered or shall all the fish of the sea be gathered so as to be enough for them?"


And God said:

"Has the Lord's power decreased at all? You shall see now whether my word shall be carried out or not."

Moses went out and told the people

the words of the Lord and gathered the seventy men of the elders. And the Lord sent forth a wind, and brought quails from the sea. He let them fall by the camp, about a day's journey on the one side and about a day's journey on the other side, all around the camp. The people went out and gathered the quails all that day and all that night and all the next day. The least that anyone gathered was about a bushel.

But even while they were eating the quails, the Lord struck the people with a terrible plague. Many of them died and were buried in that place.





# THE ISRAELITES PREPARE TO ENTER CANAAN



HE Lord spoke to Moses in the wilderness of Paran saying: "Send out men to

look over the land of Canaan, which I have promised to the children of Israel. Send a man from every tribe, each one to be a ruler among his people."

Moses chose twelve men, one from each of the tribes of Israel. He sent them to spy out the land of Canaan, saying to them:

"Go up into the mountains and look over the land. See what it is like, whether the people who dwell there are strong or weak, few or many. See what the land itself is like that they dwell in, whether it is good or bad. See what their cities are like, whether they live in tents or in strong buildings. See whether the land is rich or poor, whether it has wood or not, and bring back some of the fruit of the land."

Now it was the time for the first ripe grapes. So the men went out and searched the land. They came to a brook, and there they cut down a branch with a cluster of grapes on it. They carried it between them slung on a staff and they brought also some

pomegranates and figs. They gave the place the name of Eschcol, meaning "a cluster of grapes", because of the grapes they had cut down there.

They searched through the land for forty days. Then they returned to Moses and Aaron and all the congregation of the children of Israel, and brought word to them and showed them the fruit of the land.



#### THE PEOPLE MURMUR AGAINST MOSES

And when the men returned, they said to Moses:

"We came to the land to which you sent us. It is indeed flowing with milk and honey, and this is the fruit of it. Yet the people are strong who dwell in the land, and the cities are walled and very large. We saw the children of Anak there. The Amalekites inhabit the south. The Hittites, the Jebusites and the Amorites live in the mountains, and the Canaanites have the land by the sea and along the River Jordan."

Caleb, who had been among the men sent to spy out the land, silenced the people and said:

"Let us go at once and take possession of the land, for we are strong enough to overcome it."

But the others who had gone out with him said:

"We are not able to fight those people, for they are stronger than we."

And they gave an evil report to the children of Israel concerning the land they had searched out, saying:

"The land which we went to look over is a land that eats up its inhabitants. All the people we saw in it are men of great height. We saw there giants, the sons of Anak who was descended from giants. We looked like grasshoppers by the side of them."

Then all the congregation lifted up their voices and cried. All the people wept that night. And the children of Israel murmured against Moses and Aaron, saying to them:

"Would to God that we had died in the land of Egypt, or that we had died in the wilderness! Why has the Lord brought us to this land to be killed in battle, so that our wives and children may be captured? Would it not be better for us to return to Egypt?"

And the people said to one another: "Let us choose a captain, and let us return to Egypt."

Then Caleb and Joshua, who had also been with those who had searched

the land, spoke to all the company of the children of Israel, saying:

"The land which we passed through to look over is an exceedingly good land. If the Lord is pleased with us, then he will bring us into this land and give it to us, a land flowing with milk and honey. But do not rebel against the Lord, and do not fear the people of the land, for they have no defence. The Lord is with us. So do not fear them."

But the people threatened to stone them. And the glory of the Lord appeared in the tabernacle before all the children of Israel, and God said to Moses:

Forgive, I beg of you, the sin of this people, according to the greatness of your mercy, as you have forgiven them from Egypt even until now."



### THE MURMURERS ARE PUNISHED

And God said to Moses:

"Because all those men who have seen my glory, and the miracles I did in Egypt and in the wilderness have not listened to my voice, they indeed shall not see the land which I promised to their fathers.

"Say to the children of Israel, 'You who have murmured against me shall die in the wilderness, but your children which you said would be captured, them will I bring to that land which you have despised. But as for you, you shall fall in this wilderness. And your children shall wander in the wilderness for forty years, one year for each of the days spent in searching out the land. For forty years I shall withhold my promise."

And of the men whom Moses sent to search out the land and who returned and made the congregation murmur against him by giving an evil report on the land, all except Caleb and Joshua died of a plague sent by the Lord.

Then the people rose up early in the morning and went to the top of the mountain saying:

"We are here, and will go to the place the Lord has promised, for we have sinned."

But Moses said to them:

"You must not go up the mountain. Because you turned away from the Lord, the Lord will not be with you."

Yet some of them continued and went without Moses and the ark of the covenant of the Lord, and they were struck down by the Amalekites and the Canaanites.

Once again there was no water for the people, and they gathered themselves together against Moses and Aaron, saving:



#### **AARON DIES**


So the children of Israel turned away from Edom, and they came to Mount Hor. And the Lord spoke to Moses and Aaron on Mount Hor, saying:

# MOSES' LAST WORDS TO HIS **PEOPLE**

HE forty years of wandering were coming to an end and Moses spoke to the

people of Israel, saying:

"Now these are the commandments, the statutes, and the judgments which the Lord your God commanded me to teach you, so that you might do them in the land which you go to possess. Hear, therefore, O Israel, and be sure to do it, that all may be well with you and that you may increase mightily, as the Lord God of your fathers promised you, in the land flowing with milk and honey.

"The Lord our God is one Lord, and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might.


"And these words which I command you this day shall be in your heart, and you shall teach them carefully to your children. You shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk along the road, and when you lie down, and when you rise up.

"You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. And you shall write them upon the posts of your house, and on your gates.

"You shall fear the Lord your God, and serve him, and shall swear by his name. You shall not go after other

gods, the gods of the people who are round about you, lest the anger of the Lord your God be kindled against you and destroy you from the face of the earth.

"And it shall come to pass when your son asks you in time to come, 'What do the testimonies and the statutes and the judgments mean?' that you shall say to



good always, that he might preserve us alive as it is this day. And it shall be our righteousness if we observe all these commandments before the Lord our God, as he has commanded us.'

"All these commandments I have given you, so that you may live, and multiply, and go in to possess the land which the Lord promised to your fathers. And you shall remember all the way which the Lord your God led you for these forty years in the wilderness, to humble you and to test you, to know what was in your hearts. whether you would keep his commandments or not. And he humbled you, and caused you to go hungry, and fed you with manna, which neither you nor your fathers had ever seen before, so that he might make you know that man does not live by bread only, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.

"You shall also remember that as a father punishes his son, so the Lord your God punishes you. Therefore you shall keep the commandments of the Lord your God, to walk in his ways and to stand in awe of him.

"For the Lord your God is bringing you to a good land, a land of brooks and water, of fountains and wells that spring out of valleys and hills; a land of wheat and barley, of vines, fig trees and pomegranates; a land of oil-olives and honey; a land where you shall have plenty of bread to eat, where you shall not lack any thing; a land whose stones are iron and out of whose hills you may dig brass.

"When you have eaten and are full, then you shall bless the Lord your God, and give him thanks for the good land he has given you.

"Beware that you forget not the Lord your God; that you keep his commandments, his judgments and his laws which I have given you.

"Take care that when you have eaten and are full, and have built fine houses to live in, and when your herds and flocks multiply, and your silver and gold and all that you have has increased, that you do not become proud and forget the Lord your God who brought you forth out of the land of Egypt, from the house of slavery; who led you through that great and terrible wilderness, where there were fierce serpents, and scorpions, and drought, and not a drop of water. Do not forget the Lord who brought you water out of the rock of flint, who fed you in the wilderness with manna so that he might humble you and test you. Take care that you do not say in your hearts, 'My power and the strength of my hand have got me these riches.'

"But you shall remember the Lord your God, for it is he who makes you able to get riches, so that he may keep the promise which he made to your fathers, as he does today.

"And it shall be, if you ever forget the Lord your God, and follow other gods and worship them, you shall indeed perish. You shall perish as the nations which the Lord has destroyed before your eyes, because you would not obey the voice of the Lord your God."

# THE LORD IS GOING BEFORE YOU

And Moses continued, saying:

"Hear, O Israel: You are to pass over Jordan, to go in to possess nations greater and stronger than you. Understand therefore that the Lord your God is going over before, that he shall destroy them as a raging fire, and he shall bring them down before you. So you shall drive them out and

destroy them quickly, as the Lord has said.

"Do not say in your heart, after the Lord your God has driven them before you, 'It is because of my own goodness that the Lord has brought me to possess this land.' It is because of the wickedness of these nations that the Lord is driving them out before you. It is not because of your own goodness, or the upright"Blessed you shall be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your body, and the fruit of your ground, and the fruit of your cattle, and the flocks of your sheep. Blessed you shall be when you come in and blessed shall you be when you go out.
"But it shall come to pass, if you

"But it shall come to pass, if you will not listen to the voice of the Lord your God and observe and do all his

ness of your heart, but because of their wickedness, and so that the Lord your God may keep the promise which he made to your fathers, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

"Therefore, as I have said, you shall keep these words of mine in your heart and in your soul, and you shall teach them to your children, speaking of them at all times: when you are in your houses, and when you are making a journey, when you lie down to sleep, and when you rise in the morning. You shall write them on the doorways of your houses and on your gates, so that you may live long, and so that your children may live long, in the land which the Lord promised your fathers.

"And it shall come to pass, if you listen diligently to the voice of the Lord your God and observe and do all his commandments, that the Lord your God will set you on high above all the nations of the earth. And all these blessings shall come to you, if you listen to the voice of the Lord your God.

commandments, that all these curses shall come upon you:

"Cursed you shall be in the city,
and cursed shall you be in the field.
Cursed shall be the fruit of your body,
and the fruit of your land,
and the flocks of your sheep.
Cursed you shall be when you come in,
and cursed shall you be when you go out.

"The Lord shall strike you with a burning fever, and with the sword and with mildew, and these shall plague you until you perish. The Lord shall make the rain of your land powder and dust. From heaven it shall come down upon you until you are destroyed.

"The Lord shall bring a nation against you from afar, from the end of the earth, as swift as the eagle flies, a nation whose tongue you shall not understand, a nation of fierce appearance which shall show no favour to the old or young. It shall besiege you at all your gates, until your high walls which you trusted come down. And it shall besiege you throughout all the

land which the Lord your God has given you.

"If you will not do all the words of this law that are written in this book, the Lord shall scatter you among all people, from one end of the earth to the other. And there you shall serve other gods which neither you nor your fathers have known, gods of wood and stone. And among these nations you shall find no ease, nor shall the sole of your foot have rest, but the Lord shall give you there a trembling heart, and failing of eyes and sorrow of mind.

"Your life shall hang in doubt before you and you shall fear day and night and shall have no assurance for your life. In the morning you shall say, 'Would to God it were evening!' And at evening you shall say, 'Would to God it were morning!' And the Lord shall bring you back into Egypt in ships, and there you shall be offered for sale as slaves, but no man shall buy

"And it shall come to pass when all these things have happened to you, the blessing and the curse, you shall return to the Lord your God and shall obey his voice according to all that I command you this day, you and your children with all your heart and with all your soul. Then the Lord your God will have compassion upon you and will return and gather you from all nations where he has scattered you. And the Lord will bring you into the land which your fathers possessed, and you shall possess it. And he will do you good and multiply you more than your fathers.

"See, I have set before you this day life and good, and death and evil. I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing. Therefore choose life so both you and your offspring may live and love the Lord your God."

# THE DEATH OF MOSES



ND Moses went and spoke these words to all Israel. Then he said to them:

"I am a hundred and twenty years old this day. I can no longer go out and come in. Also the Lord has said to me, 'You shall not go over the Jordan.' Joshua, he shall go over before you, as the Lord has said."

And Moses called Joshua and said to him in the sight of all Israel:

For the Lord's portion is his people, Jacob is his inheritance.

He found him in a desert land, and in the waste of the howling wilderness.

He led him about, he instructed him, he kept him as the apple of his eye.

As an eagle stirs up her nest, flutters over her young, spreads out her wings, takes them, carries them on her wings.

So the Lord alone did lead him, and there was no strange god with him.

He made him ride on the high places of the earth, that he might eat the increase of the fields, and he made him suck honey out of the rock, and oil out of the flinty rock.

#### JOSHUA SENDS SPIES


Joshua sent two men to spy on Jericho. They went there and came to the house of a woman named Rahab and took a room there.


"It shall be just as you say," she said. Then she sent them away, and after they had left she tied the piece of scarlet cord in the window.


The second day they circled the city once and returned to the camp. This they did for six days.

# JOSHUA AND THE HIVITES


ND God said to Joshua: "Fear not, and be not dismayed. Take all the people

of war with you and go up to the city of Ai. I have given to you the king of Ai and his people and his city and his land, and you shall do to Ai and her king as you did to Jericho and her king."

So Joshua did as the Lord had told him. He ambushed the city of Ai and destroyed it utterly. And the possessions and the cattle of the people of Ai were given as booty to the children of Israel.

All the cities of Jordan were afraid of Joshua when they heard what had happened to Jericho and Ai. And they gathered themselves together with one accord to fight with Joshua and Israel.

The people of Gibeon, who were



rich and wily, wanted to make a treaty with him. They sent messengers, dressed in tattered clothing, with mouldy bread in their packs and with patched and leaking wineskins. These messengers came to Joshua in his camp at Gilgal, saying that they had come from a far country.

And Joshua said: "Who are you? And where do you come from?"

The men of Gibeon answered: "We have come from a very distant country. This bread of ours was taken hot and fresh from the oven when we started out, and now, behold, it is dry and mouldy. These skins which we filled with wine were then new, and, behold, they are split. And our garments and shoes have become old because of the length of our journey."

The men of Israel looked at the food and the wineskins and the clothes and did not ask counsel from the mouth of the Lord. Joshua drew up a peace treaty and swore a solemn oath that the Israelites would keep it.

But three days later they learned that these were their neighbours, the Hivites. The children of Israel reached the rich city of Gibeon, but they could not fight, because of the solemn peace treaty.

Then Joshua sent for the Hivites and asked: "Why have you cheated us, saying you live very far from us, when you dwell among us? Now you are cursed, and none of you shall be freed from being bondsmen and hewers of wood and drawers of water for the house of God."

And the people of Gibeon said: "We were told that the Lord your God commanded his servant Moses to give you all the land and to destroy all the inhabitants of the land. Therefore we were afraid of our lives, because of you, and that is why we did this thing. But now we are in your hands and we shall do as you say."

#### THE SUN AND MOON OBEY JOSHUA

When the king of Jerusalem heard that Joshua had made peace with the Hivites he was afraid, because Gibeon was a rich and royal city and its men were famous for their might. So he conspired with four other kings and they set forth to lay siege to Gibeon.

The Gibeonites sent a message to Joshua, who was in his camp at Gilgal, saying: "Come quickly and save us, for all the kings of the Amorites that dwell in the mountains have joined together against us."

And God said unto Joshua: "Fear them not, for I have delivered them into your hands. Not a man of them shall stand before thee."

So Joshua and his army left Gilgal and took the Amorites by surprise and killed many of them and put the others to flight. As they fled, the Lord cast hailstones from heaven upon them, and more Amorites died from these hailstones than were killed by the children of Israel.

Then Joshua spoke: "Sun, stand still above Gibeon, and moon, stay above the valley of Ajalon."

And the sun stood still and the moon stayed, until the Israelites had avenged themselves upon their enemies. And never before had there been a day like this, when the Lord obeyed the voice of a man; for the Lord fought for Israel.

So Joshua struck all the country of the hills and of the vale and of the springs, and all their kings. He left none remaining, but utterly destroyed all that breathed, as the Lord God of Israel commanded. "I am old and stricken in age. And you have seen all that the Lord your



And they buried him in the borders of his inheritance, in Timnath-serah which is on the mount of Ephraim, on the north side of the hill of Gaash.

ECAUSE the children of Israel did evil in the sight of the Lord, the Lord

made them the captives of Jabin, king of Canaan. Jabin's army was commanded by a great captain called Sisera. He had nine hundred chariots, and for twenty years he oppressed the children of Israel.

So the children of Israel conquered Jabin, king of Canaan, and the land was at peace for forty years.

#### SONG OF REJOICING


Then Deborah and Barak the son of Abinoam sang on that day these words:

### GIDEON AND THE MIDIANITES

N time the children of Israel went back to their evil ways. Because of this the

Lord delivered them into the power of the Midianites for seven years. The Midianites ravaged the land, and the children of Israel were obliged to live in dens in the mountains and in caves and fortified places.

When the seven years were up, an angel of the Lord came and sat under an oak in Ophrah which belonged to Joash the Abiezerite. His son Gideon was threshing wheat to hide from the Midianites.

#### AN ANGEL APPEARS TO GIDEON

The angel of the Lord appeared to Gideon and said to him: "The Lord is with you, you mighty man of valour."

Gideon said to him: "O my Lord, if the Lord is with us, why has all this happened to us? Where are all his miracles, of which our fathers told us? Did not the Lord bring us up from Egypt? The Lord has forsaken us now, and has given us up to the Midianites."

"I will wait here until you come again," the angel said.

So Gideon went in and prepared a young goat and some unleavened cakes. The meat he put in a basket and he put the broth in a pot and brought it out to the angel and presented it.

The angel of God said to him: "Take the meat and the unleavened cakes and lay them upon this rock and pour out the broth."

Gideon did as he was commanded.

Then the angel of the Lord stretched out the end of the staff that was in his hand and touched the meat and the unleavened cakes, and fire rose up out of the rock and consumed the meat and the unleavened cakes. And the angel of the Lord disappeared from sight.

When Gideon saw that this was indeed an angel of the Lord, he said: "Alas! O Lord God! I am frightened because I have seen an angel of the Lord God face to face."

But God said to him: "Be at peace; do not be afraid, you shall not die."

Then Gideon built an altar to the Lord and called it Yahweh-Shalom, which means "The Lord is Peace".



#### GOD ADDRESSES GIDEON

That same night God spoke to him again and said: "Take a seven-year-old bull from your father's herd, and go to the altar which your father has set up to Baal. Throw down the altar and cut down the grove of trees that is by it. Then build an altar to the Lord God on the top of the rock, and kindle a fire from the wood of the grove, and sacrifice the bull to the Lord."

So Gideon took ten of his servants and did as the Lord had commanded him to do. He dared not do it in the daytime, for fear of the villagers and the rest of his father's household, so he did it under cover of night.

The next morning the villagers saw what had happened. When they discovered that Gideon was responsible for the pulling down of Baal's altar, they went to Joash and said: "Bring out your son, for he must die."

But Joash defended Gideon and said: "Do you have to plead for Baal, who is a god? If any of you dare to, let him be put to death at once. Let Baal speak for himself."

Then the Midianites and the Amalekites banded together and camped in the valley of Jezreel, but the spirit of the Lord came upon Gideon and he blew a trumpet and all the men flocked to his side.

Gideon spoke to the Lord saying: "If you will save Israel by my hand, give me a token. Behold, I shall put a fleece of wool on the floor and if the dew is on the fleece only and all the earth beside it is dry, I shall know that you mean me to save Israel."

The next morning he rose early and wrung a bowlful of water out of the fleece.

But still he doubted and said: "Do not be angry with me, but grant me one more sign. Let the fleece be dry

and upon all the ground let there be dew." And the Lord did so that night; for only the fleece was dry, and there was dew on all the ground.

#### GIDEON PICKS HIS MEN

Then Gideon assembled an army of the men of Israel behind him. They pitched their tents beside the well of Harod, so that the ranks of the Midianites were off to the north of them by the hill of Moreh, in the valley.

And God said to Gideon: "The people with you are too many for me to give them a victory over the Midianites, for then Israel might boast of its own power, saying, 'Our own hands have saved us.' Go to the people, therefore, and tell everyone who is fearful and afraid, to go back, and leave Mount Gilead."

Twenty-two thousand of the people returned, and ten thousand stayed.

Then God spoke to Gideon, saying: "There are still too many people. Bring them down to the water, and I will test them for you. If I say, 'This one shall go with you,' he shall go with you, and if I say, 'This one shall not go with you,' he shall not go."

So Gideon brought the people down to the water, and God said to Gideon: "Set apart those who lap the water with their tongues, as a dog laps, and those who kneel down to drink."

The number of those who lapped, putting their hands to their mouths, was three hundred men. All the rest of the people bowed down upon their knees to drink the water.

Then God said to Gideon: "By the three hundred men who lapped, I will save you and will deliver the Midianites into your hands. Let all the other people go to their homes."

So the chosen people took food in

their hands, and their trumpets, and Gideon sent all the rest of the Israelites to their tents and kept only those three hundred men. And the army of Midian was beneath, in the valley.

#### THEY SPY ON THE MIDIANITES

The same night God spoke to Gideon, saying:

"Arise, go down to the camp, for I have given it into your hands. But if you are afraid to go down, take your servant Phurah down with you to the camp. You will hear what the Midianites are saying, and afterward your hands will be strengthened for the battle."

Gideon went down with Phurah to the outermost of the armed men that were in the camp. There the Midianites and the Amalekites and all the children of the east lay along the valley, like grasshoppers in their numbers, and their camels were countless, as many as the sands by the seaside.

When Gideon came near, a man was telling a dream to his companion, and he said:


"I have dreamed a dream, and in it a cake of barley bread tumbled into the camp of Midian. It came to a tent and struck it so that the tent fell and overturned, and lay upon the ground."

His companion answered and said:
"This is nothing else than the sword of Gideon, the son of Joash, a man of Israel. For God is giving him a victory war. Midian and all the army."

When Gideon heard the telling of the dream and the interpretation of it, he worshipped God. Then he returned to the army of Israel and said: "Arise, for the Lord has given into your hands the army of Midian."

He divided the three hundred men into three companies, and he put a trumpet into every man's hand, and gave them empty pitchers with lights inside them.

"Watch me and do likewise," he said to them. "And see that when I come to the outskirts of the camp, you do whatever I do. When I and those who are with me blow on our trumpets, then you blow on your trumpets too, on every side of the whole camp, and shout: 'The sword of the Lord and of Gideon!'"



#### THE ISRAELITES ATTACK

So Gideon and the hundred men who were with him came to the outskirts of the camp in the beginning of the middle watch, when a new watch had just been posted. Then they blew on their trumpets and broke the pitchers that they held in their hands. And the three companies all blew on their trumpets and broke the pitchers and held the lights in their left hands and the trumpets in their right hands. And they cried: "The sword of the Lord and of Gideon!"

They stood, every man in his place, round about the camp, and all the army of Midian awoke and cried out.

The three hundred blew on their trumpets and through the whole army of the Midianites the Lord made men turn their swords against one another, and they fled in confusion. The men of Israel pursued them beyond Jordan, killing their leaders Oreb and Zeeb.

Then the men of Israel said to Gideon: "Be our ruler, you and your son and your son's son, for you have delivered us from the hand of Midian."

But Gideon said: "I will not rule over you, neither shall my son rule over you. The Lord shall rule over you. But I have one request to make of you. Will you all give me the gold earrings that you took from your prey?"

For the Midianites were Ishmaelites and wore gold rings in their ears.


The men of Israel said: "We give them willingly."

these, Abimelech, went to his mother's people in Shechem and said to them: "Do you want all those seventy sons of Gideon to reign over you? Would you not rather it were I alone, who am your near relation?"

They agreed that they would rather have him as ruler, and they gave him seventy pieces of silver with which he hired mercenaries who followed him to Ophrah. There Abimelech slew all his brothers except Jotham, the youngest, who hid himself.

Then all the men of Shechem gathered together and hailed Abimelech as king.

Jotham heard of this and he went and stood on the top of Mount Gerizim, and lifted up his voice. And he cried: "Listen to me, you men of Shechem, that the Lord may give ear to you.

"The trees went forth once upon a time to choose a king, and they said to the olive tree, 'Rule over us.' "But the olive tree said to them, 'Should I leave my rich oil, by means of which both men and gods are honoured, and go to be king over the trees?"

"Then the trees said to the fig tree, 'You come and rule over us.'

"But the fig tree said to them, 'Should I forsake my sweetness and my good fruit, and go to be king over the trees?'


"Then the trees said to the vine, 'You come and rule over us.'

"And the vine said to them, 'Should I leave my wine which cheers gods and men, and go to be king over the trees?"

"Draw your sword and kill me, so that nobody can say that I was slain by a woman."

Thus was Jotham's parable fulfilled.





# JEPHTHAH'S VOW

EPHTHAH, the son of Gilead, was a mighty man of valour. He was a soldier

After the battle he went back to Mizpah and as he approached his house, his daughter came out to meet him with timbrels and dances. She was his only child and he loved her more than all things of the world.


When he saw her Jephthah rent his


So they said: "Tell us your riddle." Samson said: "Out of the eater came forth meat, and out of the strong came forth sweetness."

Then he went back to his father's house. He was exceedingly angry at the Philistines and with the woman whom he had married.

### SAMSON ANGERS THE PHILISTINES

He caught three hundred foxes and tied them tail to tail, and fixed torches between their tails. Then he set fire to the torches and let the foxes go to run among the cornfields of the Philistines. The shocks and the standing corn, the vineyards, and the olives all caught fire and were burned up.

After this the Philistines went up and pitched their camp in Judah at Lehi, and the men of Judah asked them why they had come.

The Philistines said: "We have come to capture and punish Samson."

Then three thousand men of Judah went up to the top of the rock Etam and said to Samson: "Do you not know that the Philistines are our overlords? We are going to bind you and give you into their hands."


Samson said: "Promise me that you will not yourselves attack me."

They said: "No, but we will bind you fast and hand you over to them. But we promise not to kill you."

So they bound him with two new cords and brought him up from the rock.

And so the young bull was slain and the woman who stood in the temple me what I asked of him. Therefore


the child was brought to Eli the priest. And Hannah said: "O my lord, I am here, praying to the Lord. I prayed for this child, and the Lord has given

NCE there was a woman named Hannah who was bitter in her soul because


she had no sons or daughters. She prayed to the Lord and wept sadly. And she vowed a vow:



Samuel listened and repeated what they had said to the Lord.


And God said to him: "Give them their way and find them a king."


And when they did find him, he was among the baggage. He was brought into the crowd, and when he stood among them he was higher than any of them from his shoulders upward.

But Samuel answered: "I will not go back with you, for you have rejected the


of yours who is better than you. The strength of Israel will not lie or repent; for he is not a man if he must repent."

### DAVID MEETS SAUL THE KING


And the spirit of the Lord departed from Saul, and an evil spirit troubled him.


David at this time left the court of Saul to go home and feed his father's sheep at Bethlehem. His three eldest brothers were in the army of Saul.

David said: "What have I now done? Is there not a reason?" He turned from him towards another man and spoke to him in the same way, and the people spoke again of the reward.


And when the people heard the words which David spoke, they repeated them before Saul, and he sent for the boy.

Therefore David ran and stood upon


the Philistine and taking Goliath's sword cut off his head and killed him.

But at the time that Merab should have been given to David, instead Saul married her to Adriel the Meholathite.



# DAVID SPARES SAUL'S LIFE



# SAUL KILLS HIMSELF




# DAVID FINDS JONATHAN'S SON

T was the time when kings go forth to battle, and David sent Joab, his gen-

eral, and his servants with him, and they destroyed the children of Ammon and besieged Rabbah. But David remained in Jerusalem.

One evening he rose from his bed and walked on the roof of his palace. He saw a very beautiful woman and sent to ask who she was. He was told: "She is Bathsheba, the daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite."

David fell in love with Bathsheba, and he sent to Joab, saying: "Send me Uriah the Hittite."


But David saw that his servants were whispering together, and he knew that the child was dead. He asked them if it was so, and they said: "He is dead."

Absalom had chariots and horses and fifty men to attend him. He would rise early in the morning and wait at the gate near the place of judgment, and if anybody came with a case to lay before the king, Absalom would call unto him and ask where he came from. Absalom had with him two hundred men from Jerusalem who knew nothing of the conspiracy, and more and more people turned to Absalom.





FTER Solomon succeeded his father David on the throne of Israel, he went one




The house was built of stone made ready before it was brought there, so that there was no sound of a hammer or axe or any tool in the house while it was being built.

The house was seven years in the building. Then the work was finished

which king Solomon had done for the house of the Lord. And Solomon brought in the things which David his father had dedicated. The silver and the gold and the vessels he put among the treasures of the house of the Lord.

Then Solomon assembled the elders of Israel and all the heads of the tribes, that they might bring the ark of the Lord's covenant into the temple at Jerusalem.

The priests brought the ark of the

covenant into the holy of holies, under the spread wings of the cherubim. There was nothing in the ark except the two tablets of stone which Moses had put there at Horeb when the Lord made a covenant with the children of Israel when they came out of the land of Egypt.

And it came to pass, when the priests had come out of the holy place, that a cloud filled the house of the Lord, so that the priests could not stand to

minister, because of the glory of the Lord which filled the house of the Lord.

And Solomon blessed all the congregation of Israel and said:

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel. I have built a house for the Lord and have set there a place for the ark wherein is the covenant of the Lord, which he made with our fathers, in the days when he brought them out of the land of Egypt."

HEN the queen of Sheba heard of the fame of Solomon, she came to see him

and to test him with hard questions. She arrived in Jerusalem with a very great train of attendants, with camels carrying spices, and much gold and precious stones. And when she had come to Solomon, she told him all the things that were on her mind. And Solomon answered all her questions, for there was nothing that he did not know.

And when the queen of Sheba had heard Solomon's wisdom, and seen the house that he had built, the food at his table, his servants, the magnificence of his ministers and his cupbearers and the entrance to the temple which he had built, there was no more spirit in her.

## ELIJAH A PROPHET OF ISRAEL


The division in 922 B.C. of the united kingdom of Israel into two parts, the northern kingdom of Israel and the southern kingdom of Judah, was a momentous event in the history of the Hebrews. After about fifty years, a king named Ahab succeeded to the throne of Israel. He married Jezebel, daughter of the king of the Zidonians, and built an altar and a temple to the heathen god, Baal, in his capital city of Samaria. He was sternly rebuked for his evil ways and worship of Baal by the prophet, Elijah.



LIJAH the Tishbite, an inhabitant of Gilead, said to Ahab: "As the Lord God

of Israel lives, before whom I stand, there will not be dew nor rain for years, unless I say the word."

Then the word of the Lord came to Elijah, saying: "Get away from here and turn eastward and hide yourself by the brook Cherith, which is this side of Jordan. There you shall drink of the brook, and I have commanded ravens to feed you there."



So he went and did as the Lord had commanded, and lived by the brook Cherith. And the ravens brought him bread and meat in the morning and again bread and meat in the evening,

and he drank of the brook.

It came to pass, after a while, that the brook dried up, because there had been no rain in the land.

Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying: "Get up and go to Zarephath, which belongs to Zidon, and live there. You will find I have commanded a widow there to feed you."

ELIJAH HEALS THE WIDOW'S SON

And when Elijah arrived at the gate of Zarephath he saw that the widow was there gathering sticks.

He called to her and said: "Fetch me, I beg of you, a little water in a vessel, so that I may have a drink." And as she was going to fetch it, he called to her and said: "Please bring me a morsel of bread."

She said: "As the Lord your God lives, I have not a loaf, but only a

handful of meal in a barrel, and a little oil in a jar. As you see, I am gathering two sticks, that I may go in and prepare it for myself and my son, so that we may eat it and die."

Elijah said to her: "Do not fear. Go and do as you have said; but make me a little cake of it first, and bring it to me, and afterwards make some for yourself and for your son. For the Lord God of Israel has said: 'The barrel of meal shall not be empty, nor the jar of oil fail, until the day when the Lord sends rain upon the earth.'"

She went and did as Elijah told her, and she and Elijah and her household ate for many days.

But it happened, after these things, that the son of the woman fell sick, and his sickness was so severe that there was no breath left in him.

The woman said to Elijah: "What have I done to you, O man of God? Have you come to me to remind me of my sins, and to kill my son?"

"Give me your son," he said to her, and he took him from her arms and carried him up to a loft where he stayed, and laid him upon his own bed.

Then he cried to the Lord and said: "O Lord my God, have you brought evil upon the widow with whom I am staying, by killing her son?"

Then he stretched himself out upon the child three times and cried to the Lord, and said: "O Lord my God, I beg you, let this child's soul come back to him."

The Lord heard the voice of Elijah, and the soul of the child came to him again, and he breathed. Then Elijah took the child and brought him down from the loft into the house, and gave him to his mother. And Elijah said: "See, your child lives!"

And the woman said to Elijah: "Now by this I know that you are a man of God, and that the word of the Lord which you preach is the truth."

## ELIJAH AND THE PRIESTS OF BAAL



ND it came to pass after many days, that the word of the Lord came to Elijah in the

third year of the famine, saying: "Go and show yourself to Ahab, and I will send rain upon the earth." And Elijah went to show himself to king Ahab.

When king Ahab saw Elijah, he said to him: "Are you the man who troubles Israel?"

Elijah answered: "It is not I who have troubled Israel, but you and your father's house, by forsaking the commandments of the Lord and following Baalim.

"Now send out and gather together all Israel at Mount Carmel, and the four hundred and fifty prophets of Baal, and the four hundred prophets of the groves who eat at queen Jezebel's table."

So Ahab sent word to all the children of Israel and gathered the prophets together at Mount Carmel.

Then Elijah came before all the people and said: "How long will you

waver between two beliefs? If the Lord is God, follow him; if Baal, follow him."

The people answered not a word.

Then Elijah said to the people: "I, and I alone, remain a prophet of the Lord, but the prophets of Baal are four hundred and fifty men. Let them, then, get us two young bulls and let them choose one bull for themselves, and cut it in pieces and lay it on the wood, but put no fire under it. And I will dress the other bull and lay it on the wood and put no fire under it.

"Then you call on the name of your gods, and I will call on the name of the Lord, and the God that answers with fire, let him be God."

And all the people answered and said: "It is well spoken."

Elijah said to the prophets of Baal: "Choose one bull for yourselves and dress it first, for there are many of you. Call on the name of your gods, but do not put any fire under it."

They took the bull which was given them, and they dressed it and called on the name of Baal from morning until noon, saying: "O Baal, hear us." But there was no voice nor any answer, though they leaped upon the altar they had made.

At noon Elijah mocked them and said: "Cry aloud, for he is a god. Either he is talking, or he is busy, or he is on a journey, or perhaps he is asleep and must be awakened."

They cried aloud, and cut themselves, as was their custom, with knives and lances, until the blood gushed out upon their robes.

When midday was past, they worshipped before the altar until time for the evening sacrifice, and still there was neither a voice nor any answer nor any sign that their gods had heard them.

Then Elijah said to all the people: "Come near to me."

All the people gathered around him





Then he walked up to the altar of the Lord which had been broken down. Elijah took twelve stones, according to the number of the tribes of the sons of Jacob which made up Israel. With the stones he built an altar in the name of the Lord, and he made a trench round the altar, large enough to hold two measures of seed. He put the wood in order, and cut the young bull in pieces and laid it on the wood.

Then he said: "Fill four barrels with water and pour it on the burnt sacrifice and on the wood."

When they had done this, he said: "Do it a second time," and they did it a second time. And he said: "Do it a third time," and they did it a third time.

The water ran around the altar, and he filled the trench with water, too.

Then when it was time for the offering of the evening sacrifice, Elijah the prophet came near and said: "Lord God of Abraham, Isaac, and of Israel, let it be known today that you are the God in Israel, and that I am your servant and have done all these things at your command.

"Hear me, O Lord, hear me, that this people may know that you are the Lord God, and that you may have their hearts again."

Then the fire of the Lord came down and consumed the burnt sacrifice and the wood and the stones and the dust, and licked up the water that was in the trench.

When all the people saw it, they fell on their faces and said: "The Lord he is the God; the Lord he is the God."

And Elijah said to them: "Take the prophets of Baal; let not one of them escape."

And they took them; and Elijah brought them down to the brook Kishon and slew them there. And by evening the rains came and thus the famine was ended.

## THE STILL SMALL VOICE



HAB recounted to Jezebel the story of all that Elijah had done, and how he

had slain all the prophets of Baal.

So Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saying: "Let the gods do to me and more still, if by this time tomorrow I do not take your life as you have taken theirs."

When Elijah heard this he arose and fled for his life, and went to Beersheba, where he left his servant. And he himself went a further day's journey into the wilderness and sat down under a juniper tree.

He prayed that he might die, and said: "It is enough, Lord. Take away my life, for I am no better than my fathers."

Then he lay down and slept under the tree and an angel awoke him, saying: "Arise and eat."

Elijah saw a cake and jar of water at his head, so he ate and drank, and slept again; and again the angel awakened him to eat. And fortified by the food, he travelled forty days and nights until he arrived at Mount Horeb.

He lived there in a cave and the word of the Lord came to him, asking: "What are you doing here, Elijah?"



Elijah said: "I have cared greatly for the Lord God of hosts, but the children of Israel have forsaken your covenants, thrown down your altars and slain your prophets with the sword. Only I remain, and they are seeking to kill me."

God said: "Go forth, and stand upon the mountain."

He did so, and a great wind blew upon the mountain and smashed the rocks, but the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind came an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire, a still small voice.

When Elijah heard the voice, he wrapped his face in his mantle and stood in the opening of the cave.

And the voice said: "What are you doing here, Elijah?"

### NABOTH'S VINEYARD



ABOTH the Jezreelite had a vineyard which was situated close to the palace of

Ahab, the king of Samaria.

Ahab said to Naboth: "Give me your vineyard, that I may turn it into a herb garden, for it is so near my house. In exchange I will give you a better vineyard, or if you prefer, I will give you its value in money."

Naboth answered: "The Lord forbid that I should give you the land which I have inherited from my forefathers."

Ahab went back to his house, depressed and vexed because of what Naboth had said. He lay down on his bed and turned his face to the wall and refused to eat.

Jezebel, his wife, came in and said: "Why are you so sad that you refuse to eat?"

Ahab said: "Because I asked Naboth to let me have his vineyard, and I offered to pay for it or give him another vineyard in exchange, but he would have none of it."

# THE PARTING OF ELIJAH AND ELISHA



ND it came to pass that when the Lord decided to take Elijah up into heaven in

a whirlwind, Elijah was with Elisha, his faithful follower, in Gilgal. Setting out from Gilgal together, Elijah and Elisha went to Bethel and Jericho.

And the followers of the prophets who were at Jericho came to Elisha and said to him: "Do you know that the Lord is going to take away your master from you today?"

He said: "Yes, I know it. Hold your peace."

And Elijah said to him: "Wait here, I beg you, for the Lord has told me to go to Jordan."

But Elisha said to him: "As the Lord lives, and as your soul lives, I will not leave you."

So the two went on. And fifty of the followers of the prophets went and stood at a distance to watch. Elijah and Elisha stood beside the Jordan.

Elijah took his mantle and folded it over, and struck the waters so that they were divided on either side, and the two men went across on dry ground. It happened, when they had crossed over, that Elijah said to Elisha: "Ask what you will of me, before I am taken away from you."

Elisha said: "Let a double portion of your spirit be upon me, I beg of you."

"You have asked a hard thing," Elijah said. "Nevertheless, if you see me when I am taken from you, you shall have your wish; but if not, you shall not have it."

It happened, as they went on and talked together, that a chariot of fire and horses of fire appeared, and swept them apart; and Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven.

Elisha saw it, and he cried: "My father, my father! The chariot of Israel and its horsemen!" Then he could not see Elijah any more, and he took hold of his own robe and ripped it in two.

He picked up Elijah's mantle, which had fallen from him, and went back and stood by the bank of the Jordan. He took Elijah's mantle and struck the waters and said: "Where is the Lord God of Elijah?" And when he had struck the waters, they parted on either side of him and Elisha crossed over.

When the followers of the prophets who had come to watch saw him, they said: "The spirit of Elijah rests on Elisha."

And they came to meet him, and bowed themselves to the ground before him.

And the men of Jericho said to him: "You can see that the situation of the city is pleasant, but the water is bad and the ground barren."

Elisha said: "Bring me a new jar and put salt in it."

They did so and he went to the source of the water and threw in the salt and said: "The Lord says that these waters are healed and they will cause no more death or barren lands." So the waters were healed for ever according to the word of Elisha.



#### ELISHA HEALS A LEPER

Naaman, captain of the army of the king of Syria, was a great man among his master's followers, and honourable. Through him, the Lord had granted freedom to Syria. He was a man of great courage; but he was a leper.

The Syrians had gone out by companies and had brought back as a captive out of the land of Israel a little girl. She was a maidservant to Naaman's wife.

She said to her mistress: "I would to God my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria, for he would cure him of his leprosy."

When the king of Syria heard what the girl had spoken, he said: "Go now, go, and I will send a letter to the king of Israel."

Naaman departed with the letter, and took with him ten talents of silver, and

six thousand pieces of gold, and ten complete changes of clothing.

He delivered to the king of Israel the letter, which said: "When you receive this letter, you will see that I have sent to you with it Naaman, my servant, that you may cure him of his leprosy."

When the king of Israel had read the letter, he tore his clothes and said: "Am I God, to kill and to make alive, that this man sends a man to me to be cured of his leprosy? Take heed, for he seeks to pick a quarrel with me."

Now when Elisha, the man of God, heard that the king of Israel was troubled, he sent word to the king, saying: "Why did you tear your clothes? Let the man come to me, and he shall know that there is a prophet in Israel."

So Naaman came with his horses and his chariot, and stood at the door of the house of Elisha.

Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying: "Go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh will be healed again, and you will be well."

But Naaman was angry and turned away, saying: "I had thought, 'He will surely come out to me and stand there and call on the name of the Lord his God and strike his hand on the place and cure the leprosy.' Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? May I not wash in them and be cured?"

His servants spoke to him, and said: "My father, if the prophet Elisha had ordered you to do some difficult thing, would you not have done it? How much better to obey when he says to you, "Wash and be made well."

Then Naaman went and dipped himself seven times in the Jordan, just as the man of God had said, and his flesh was once again like the flesh of a little child, and he was well.

He went back to the man of God, he and all his company, and came and stood before him, and he said: "Now

I know that there is no God in all the earth but in Israel. And so I beg of you to accept a token of your servant's gratitude."

But Elisha said: "As the Lord lives, I will accept nothing. Go in peace."

And Naaman went on his way.

### ELISHA'S SERVANT FOLLOWS NAAMAN

But Gehazi, the servant of Elisha, said to himself: "See, my master has refused to accept the gift offered by this Naaman the Syrian. As the Lord lives, I will run after him and obtain something for myself."

So Gehazi followed Naaman, and when Naaman saw him running after him, he came down from his chariot and went to meet him, and said: "Is all well?"

Gehazi said: "All is well. My master has sent me to tell you that two young men of the sons of the prophets have just now arrived from Mount Ephraim, and will you give them a talent of silver and two changes of garments?"

Naaman said: "Be content, take two talents." And he packed two talents of silver and the changes of clothing in two bags and gave them to two of his servants, and they carried them for Gehazi.


When he came to the tower, Gehazi took the bags from them and put them in the house, and told the men to go. Then he went and stood before his master.

And Elisha said to him: "Where have you been, Gehazi?"

He said: "Your servant has not been anywhere."

Elisha said: "Did I not go in spirit with you when the man left his chariot to meet you? Is this the moment to receive money, and to receive garments and olive groves, and vineyards and sheep and oxen and menservants and maidservants? The leprosy of which Naaman was cured has passed over to you and to your descendants for ever more."

And Gehazi went from his presence a leper as white as snow.



## THE ANOINTING OF JEHU

The curing of Naaman took place during one of the brief truces between Israel and Syria, which more often than not were fighting against each other. In one battle, Ahab, king of Israel, was killed. He was soon followed to the throne of Israel by Joram, a son. Meanwhile, in the south, Ahaziah, a grandson of Ahab, became king of Judah upon the death of his father, who had married a daughter of Ahab. Jezebel, Ahab's wife, remained in Israel. Such was the situation when Elisha set about helping to fulfil the prophecy of Elijah concerning destruction of the "posterity of Ahab."



LISHA the prophet called one of his followers and said to him: "Go to Ra-

moth-Gilead and look for Jehu, the son of Jehoshaphat, the son of Nimshi, and cause him to leave his friends and take him into an inner room. Then take this vial of oil and pour it on his head and say: 'Thus says the Lord, I have anointed you king over Israel.' Then open the door and flee."

So the young man, who was himself a prophet, went to Ramoth-Gilead and

told Jehu that he had a message for him. Jehu arose and went into his house, and the prophet poured oil on to his head and said: "Thus says the Lord God of Israel, I have anointed you king over the people of the Lord, even over Israel. And you shall smite the house of Ahab your master, that I may avenge the blood of my servants the prophets, and the blood of all the servants of the Lord, at the hand of Jezebel."

Then the young man opened the door and fled. Jehu went back to his people and one of them said to him:

"Is all well? What did this madman want with you?"

Jehu told them what the young man had said and they blew on trumpets in a chariot towards Jezreel, where king



wounded after a battle with king Hazael of Syria.

A watchman stood on the tower in Jezreel and he saw the company of Jehu approaching and told the king of it. Joram said: "Send a horseman to meet them and ask: 'Do you come in peace?" "

So the horseman went to meet Jehu and said: "The king asks if you come in peace?" Jehu said: "What have you to do with peace? Get behind me."

As he did not return, the watchman sent out another messenger who asked Jehu the same question, and again Jehu answered: "What have you to do with peace? Get behind me "

Then the watchman said: "The messenger reached them, but he has not

returned; and the driving is like the driving of Jehu, for he drives furiously."

#### JEHU SLAYS JORAM

Joram said: "Make ready." His chariot was prepared, and together with Ahaziah, king of Judah, king Joram of Israel went forth to battle, and met Jehu in the land that had belonged to Naboth the Jezreelite. And Jehu drew a bow with all his might and smote Joram between his arms and the arrow went out at his heart, and he sank down in his chariot.

Then Jehu said to Bidkar, his captain: "Take him up and throw him into the field of Naboth the Jezreelite, for today the blood of Naboth and his sons has been avenged on his own ground."

When Ahaziah saw what had happened, he fled by way of a garden house, but Jehu followed and smote him; and he fled to Megiddo and died there. Thus Jehu overcame both Joram of Israel and Ahaziah of Judah.

#### JEZEBEL IS KILLED

When Jehu came to Jezreel, Jezebel heard about it. She painted her face and dressed her hair and looked down from a window. As Jehu entered through the city gate, she said: "Was there any peace for Zimri who killed his master?"


He looked up to the window and said: "Who is on my side?"

Two or three servants looked down at him, and he said: "Throw her down." So they threw her down, and he trod her underfoot.

When Jehu had come in, he ate and drank, and said: "Go, see now this accursed woman and bury her; for she is a king's daughter."

And thus was fulfilled the prophecy of Elijah the Tishbite concerning queen Jezebel.





## THE CROWNING OF JOASH

Jehu completed his destruction of the family of Ahab by slaying seventy of his sons. After this he had all Israel's Baal worshippers put to death. Jehu's slaying of a grandson of Ahab, king Ahaziah of Judah, was to set in motion further killings by Ahaziah's widowed mother, Athaliah, who was eager to be queen of Judah.

HEN Athaliah of Judah saw that her son Ahaziah was dead, she caused all

the royal children to be put to death. But Jehosheba, the wife of Jehoiada, the high priest, rescued Joash, the son of Ahaziah, by hiding him and his nurse in the sleeping apartment, so that he was not slain. The boy was concealed for six years in the house of the Lord with Jehosheba and Jehoiada, while queen Athaliah reigned in Judah.

In the seventh year Jehoiada fetched all the rulers and the chief captains, and brought them to the house of the Lord, and made a covenant with them. They swore a solemn oath to him, and he brought them the king's son saying: "This is the thing you shall do. A third of your number shall come into the house of the Lord on the sabbath and keep watch over the king's house. A third shall be at the gate of Sur; and a third at the gate behind the guard, so that the house of the Lord will be safely guarded. The two companies who go off duty on the sabbath will also join in keeping the watch of the house of the Lord. You shall guard the king by surrounding him each man with his sword in hand. If anyone comes within the precincts, he shall be killed. You shall remain with the king both when he goes out and when he comes in."

The captains did as they were commanded, and Jehoiada gave them king David's spears and shields, which were in the temple. The guards stood fully armed throughout the temple, surrounding the king, and Jehoiada presented the young Joash to them and crowned him. They gave him the royal insignia and anointed him, and all the people clapped their hands and said: "God save the king."

When Athaliah heard the noise of the guard and the people, she came to the temple of the Lord. She looked in and saw the king standing by a pillar, as was the custom at a coronation, and the princes and the trumpeters beside him, and all the people rejoicing to the sound of trumpets.

Athaliah rent her clothes and cried: "Treason! Treason!"

Jehoiada said to the captains of the host: "Take her out of the temple and if anybody follows her, put him to death with the sword. She must not die within the precincts of the house of the Lord."

So they seized her and took her on to the road by which horses approached the palace. There she was slain.



Jehoiada made a covenant between the Lord and the king and the people, that they should all be the Lord's people. And the people of the land went into the house of Baal and broke it down. They smashed its altars and

its images and they slew Mattan, the priest of Baal, before the altar.

Joash came by way of the guards' gate from the house of the Lord to the king's house, and there he reigned under the name Jehoash.

## THE DEATH OF ELISHA

OW Elisha had fallen ill and was on his deathbed. And king Jehoash of Israel, a

grandson of Jehu, came to Elisha and wept over him and said: "O my father, my father, the chariot of Israel and the horsemen thereof."

Elisha said to him: "Take a bow and

arrows." And he took a bow and arrows.

Elisha said to the King of Israel: "Put your hand on the bow." He did so, and Elisha put his hands upon the king's hands. He said: "Open the window to the east." The king opened it.

Then Elisha said: "Shoot," and the king shot.


"The arrow of the Lord's deliverance," said Elisha, "and the arrow of deliverance from Syria. You shall smite the Syrians in Aphek till you have consumed them. Now, take the arrows." The king took them.

Elisha said: "Strike the ground."
He struck it three times and then did

so no more.

The man of God was angry with him and said: "You should have struck five or six times, for then you would have struck Syria until you had destroyed it, whereas now you will strike Syria three times only."

And Elisha died and was buried.




## WARNINGS FROM THE PROPHETS

In accordance with Elisha's dying words, Israel won three battles against Syrian forces. But after the prosperous reign of Jeroboam II, son of Jehoash, Israel became weaker and weaker, caught up in a series of internal political intrigues and assassinations.

This beginning of Israel's end was predicted with scorn and vehemence by a visionary shepherd from Judah. This was Amos, the first of many prophets to forecast the downfall of the Hebrew nations. He preached in Israel during the end of Jeroboam's rule around the middle of the eighth century B.C. In particular he attacked the life of luxury and spiritual indifference that he saw as the source of Israel's weakness.

Woe to them that are at ease in Zion, and cause the violence to come near; That lie upon beds of ivory, and stretch themselves upon their couches, And eat the lambs out of the flock, and the calves from the midst of the stall, That chant to the sound of the viol, and invent for themselves instruments of music, like David: That drink wine in bowls. and anoint themselves with ointments! Shall not the land tremble for this, and everyone mourn that dwells therein? And it shall come to pass in that day, says the Lord God, that I will cause the sun to go down at noon, And I will turn your feast into mourning, and all your songs into lamentation. Behold the days come, says the Lord, that I will send a famine in the land; Not a famine of bread, nor a thirst for water. but of hearing the words of the Lord. And they shall wander from sea to sea, and from the north even to the east, They shall run to and fro to seek the word of the Lord,

and shall not find it.



#### HOSEA'S MESSAGE OF HOPE

Amos was followed closely, in time and in theme, by the prophet Hosea. He preached also in the northern kingdom of Israel, as the dark shadow of a power far more dangerous than Syria stretched closer and closer to Israel's borders. While predicting the approaching disaster, Hosea also held out hope, calling for repentance and promising redemption through God's mercy and love.

O Israel, return unto the Lord your God, for you have fallen by your iniquity. Take with you words, and turn to the Lord. Say unto him, Take away all iniquity, and receive us graciously. His branches shall spread, and his beauty shall be as the olive tree. They that dwell in his shadow shall return; they shall revive as the corn and grow as the vine. Who is wise, and he shall understand these things; prudent, and shall know them? For the ways of the Lord are right, and the just shall walk in them; But the transgressors shall fall therein.

#### ISAIAH'S VISION

Both during and after the time of Hosea in Israel, one of the greatest of all Hebrew prophets, Isaiah, was active in Judah, the southern kingdom. Like Israel, Judah had enjoyed a long period of peace and prosperity—during much of the reigns of Jehoash's son, Amaziah, and grandson, Uzziah.

Isaiah was not only a visionary preacher but also a wise statesman and adviser of Judah's kings through years of constant crises. These arose from military threats from without, from traditional opponents such as Syria and Israel, and from a new and dangerous friend, Assyria.

In the year that king Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne lifted up on high, and his train filled the temple. Above it stood the seraphim. Each had six wings: with two he covered his face, with two he covered his feet, and with two he did fly.

One cried to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts. The whole earth is full of his glory."

The posts of the door moved at the voice of him who cried, and the house was filled with smoke. Then I said:

"Woe is me! For I am ruined, because I am a man of unclean lips and I dwell in the midst of people of unclean lips, and now my eyes have seen the king, the Lord of hosts."

Then one of the seraphim flew at me, bearing in his hand a live coal which he had taken from the altar with tongs. He laid it upon my mouth and said:

"Behold, this has touched your lips; your wickedness is taken away, and your sin is removed."

And I heard the voice of the Lord saying: "Whom shall I send? Who will go for us?"


"Here I am," I said. "Send me."
And the Lord said:

"Go and tell this people: 'You hear, but you do not understand. You see, but you do not know what you see.'

"Weigh down the heart of this people and make their ears heavy, and shut their eyes, lest they see with their eyes, and hear with their ears and understand with their hearts, and change their ways and become healed."

Then I said, "How long, O Lord?" And God answered:

"Until the cities are wasted and without inhabitants, and the houses are vacant, and the land is utterly desolate. Then the Lord will have removed the men far away, and the whole land will be forsaken."

"'Take heed and be quiet. Fear not these two smoking firebrands, Syria and Israel. For, although they have made an evil plan against you, it shall not come to pass."


Moreover, God spoke to Ahaz, saying:

gold that was found in the house of the Lord and in the king's treasury,



and sent it as a present to the king of Assyria. Then the king of Assyria answered Ahaz's plea and went out against Damascus and killed the king of Syria.

The Assyrians not only overthrew Damascus and the king of Syria; they also a few years later besieged and captured Samaria, capital of the northern kingdom. The downfall of Samaria in 722 B.C. meant the end of Israel as a nation. The Israelites were marched off and scattered through other parts of the Assyrian Empire.

Meanwhile Judah the southern kingdom managed miraculously to survive. The Assyrians attacked Jerusalem in 701 B.C. but their troops were struck by plague and forced to withdraw. The aged Isaiah saw in these events the deliverance of his people through the working of the hand of God. This was an important function of the prophets: to interpret and demonstrate the actions



## JOSIAH A RIGHTEOUS KING

After king Ahaz's death, his son Hezekiah reigned, followed by Manasseh, Amon and then Josiah. It was during Josiah's rule, in the last quarter of the seventh century B.C. that one of the major events in Hebrew history occurred, the finding of the Book of the Law, Deuteronomy. This document, which contains many of the rules for behaviour and worship followed by Hebrews and Christians to this day, deeply impressed king Josiah. He tried to put its commands into effect by abolishing many of the pagan elements that had crept into the worship of his people.




OSIAH was eight years old when he began to rule, and he ruled thirty-one

years in Jerusalem. He did that which was right in the sight of the Lord and followed in the steps of David his forefather, and turned not aside to the right nor to the left.

And it came to pass in the eighteenth year of king Josiah's reign that the king sent Shaphan the son of Azaliah, the scribe, to the house of the Lord.

And when Shaphan the scribe went to the temple of the Lord, Hilkiah the high priest said to him:



"I have found the Book of the Law in the house of the Lord." And Hilkiah gave the book to Shaphan, and he read it.

Then Shaphan the scribe showed the king the book, saying:

"Hilkiah the priest has delivered this book to me."

And Shaphan read it before the king. And when the king had heard the words of the Book of the Law he tore his clothes, for he knew his fathers had not listened to the words of this book, to obey all the laws that were written down for them.

The king sent for all the elders of Judah and of Jerusalem. Then he went up to the house of the Lord, taking all the men of Judah and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem with him, both the priests and the prophets and all the people, both small and great, and he

read into their ears all the words of the book of the covenant which was found in the house of the Lord.

The king stood by a pillar and made a covenant before the Lord, to walk in his ways and to keep his commandments and follow his words and his laws, with all his heart and with all his soul, and to live up to the words of this covenant that were written in the book; and all the people agreed to the covenant.

### JOSIAH BANISHES IDOL WORSHIP

Then the king commanded Hilkiah the high priest, and the priests of the second order, and the keepers of the door, to bring forth out of the temple of the Lord all the vessels that were made for Baal and his sacred wood, and for all the other gods; and he burned them outside of Jerusalem in the fields of Kidron, and carried the ashes of them to Bethel.

He put down the idolatrous priests, whom the kings of Judah had ordained to burn incense in the high places in the cities of Judah and in the places round about Jerusalem, and also those who burned incense to Baal, to the sun, and to the moon, and to the planets, and to all the various gods. Josiah destroyed also the workers with ghosts and magic, and the wizards, and the images, and the idols and all the evil things that were to be found in the land of Judah and in Jerusalem. so that he might live up to the words of the law which were written in the book that Hilkiah the priest found in the house of the Lord.

There had been no king like Josiah. For he turned to the Lord with all his heart, and with all his soul, and with all his might, according to all the law of Moses; neither did any come after him who was his equal.

your herds. They shall eat up your vines and your fig trees. And it shall come to pass when you shall say, 'Why does the Lord our God do these things to us?' that I shall answer, 'You have forsaken me and served strange gods in your land. Therefore shall you serve strangers in a land that is not yours.'

"Hear now this, O foolish people, which have eyes and see not, which have ears and hear not."

During king Josiah's reign, another great Hebrew figure appeared as a prophet in Judah. This was Jeremiah, who like Isaiah was both an inspired spokesman for his God and a shrewd analyst of current affairs. Active under five kings of Judah during a time when his country was always at the mercy of stronger powers, Jeremiah often advised compliance. This frequently put him at odds with Judah's leaders.

In the last years of Josiah's rule, Nineveh, the Assyrian capital, fell to the forces of Babylon. Jeremiah saw the rise of this power in the east as an evil omen for Jerusalem and the kingdom of Judah.



HE words of the Lord came to the prophet Jeremiah, saying:

"I will bring a nation upon you from far away, O house of Israel. It is a mighty nation. It is an ancient nation, a nation whose language you do not know, nor understand. And they shall eat up your harvest and your bread, which your sons and daughters should eat. They shall eat up your flocks and one thousand talents of silver and one talent of gold from the land of Judah, so Jehoiakim taxed the people to find the silver and gold to give to Pharaoh. He was twenty-five years old when he began to rule, and he did that which was evil in the sight of the Lord.

During his reign, Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, came to Jerusalem, and Jehoiakim became his vassal. After three years he rebelled against him.

But the Lord sent bands of Chaldees

his territory between the Nile and the Euphrates.


Jehoiachin ruled for only three months. Then Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, came up to besiege Jerusalem, and Jehoiachin surrendered himself to Nebuchadnezzar with his mother and his servants, his princes and his officers. The king of Babylon took him prisoner and he also took away all the treasures of the house of the Lord and the treasures of the king's





King Josiah was slain in battle at Megiddo, and his son Jehohoaz reigned in his place. But after three months he was deposed by Pharaoh, king of Egypt, who then made his brother, Jehoiakim, king.

Now Pharaoh demanded tribute of



By now the king of Egypt had lost his power and remained behind his own frontiers, for the king of Babylon had taken possession of all house. And he cut in pieces all the vessels of gold which Solomon had made for the temple of the Lord.

He carried away all the princes, seven thousand mighty men of valour, a thousand craftsmen and blacksmiths—in all ten thousand captives. Only the poorest people were left in the country.

Nebuchadnezzar took Jehoiachin

away to Babylon, and Jehoiachin's mother and his wives and his officers, and all that were strong and likely warriors. All were taken to Babylon.

And the king of Babylon made Mattaniah, uncle of Jehoiachin, king of Judah in his place. And he changed Mattaniah's name to Zedekiah.

Zedekiah was twenty-one years old when he began to rule and he ruled eleven years in Jerusalem. And he did that which was evil in the sight of the Lord, according to all that done by Jehoiakim.

And it came to pass that Zedekiah rebelled against the king of Babylon. So in the ninth year of his reign in the tenth month, in the tenth day of the month, Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, came with all his army and laid siege against Jerusalem.

### JEREMIAH FORETELLS THE FATE OF ZEDEKIAH

Then Zedekiah the king sent two priests to Jeremiah the prophet, saying: "Pray to the Lord our God for us."

At that time, Jeremiah was not in prison, as he often was, but was going about freely among the people. Pharaoh's army had set out from Egypt, and when the Chaldeans heard of this, they departed from their siege of Jerusalem.

The word of the Lord came to Jeremiah, saying:

"This you shall say to the king of Judah: 'Behold, Pharaoh's army which has set out to help you, shall go back to Egypt, and the Chaldeans shall come again and attack this city and burn it down. Do not deceive yourselves, says the Lord, or tell yourselves that the Chaldeans shall go away again, for they shall not depart.

"Even if you were to defeat the whole Chaldean army, and there were none left but wounded men, still would

each one of them rise in his tent, and burn this city with fire."

But some of the nobles, hearing what Jeremiah had told the king, that the city was going to fall into the hands of Babylon, went to the king and said:

"We entreat you to allow us to put this man to death, for by his words he is sapping the fighting spirit of the people."

"He is in your power," Zedekiah said. "The king can do nothing against your will."

So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the dungeon of Machiah the son of Hammelech, which was a cistern in the court of the prison. They let Jeremiah down with cords into the underground dungeon. There was no water in it, only mud. And Jeremiah sank in the mud.

Now Ebed-melech the Ethiopian, who was one of the king's slaves, heard what had happened to Jeremiah, and he spoke to the king who was sitting in judgment at the gate of Benjamin. He said:


"My Lord King, these men have done wrong in casting Jeremiah the prophet into the dungeon. He will die from hunger there, for there is no more bread in the city."

So the king told Ebed-melech the Ethiopian to take thirty men and rescue Jeremiah from the dungeon before he starved to death.

Ebed-melech took the men and collected some old rags and scraps of material and let them down by ropes into the dungeon. Then he called Jeremiah, saying:

"Put these rags under your armpits to protect you from the rope."

Jeremiah did so, and they pulled him up out of the muddy cistern, and he was sent back into a better prison. King Zedekiah sent for him again, and bade him come to the entrance of the temple.

Then king Zedekiah swore a secret oath to Jeremiah, and said:

"As the Lord our Creator lives, I will not have you put to death, nor will I hand you over to the men who want to kill you."

#### ZEDEKIAH IGNORES JEREMIAH'S ADVICE

Jeremiah the prophet answered king Zedekiah and said:

"Thus says the Lord, the God of hosts, the God of Israel: If you will go forth to the officers of the king of Babylon, your life will be spared. This city will not be destroyed by fire, and you and your family will survive. But if you will not go forth to the king of Babylon's officers, then this city will be given into the power of the Chaldeans, and they will burn it to the ground, and you will not escape out of their hand."

Jeremiah remained in the prison until the day that Jerusalem fell. He was there when Jerusalem was taken.

## JERUSALEM IS DESTROYED




HE Chaldeans laid siege to Jerusalem during eleven years of Zedekiah's reign.

## DANIEL CAPTIVITY

Some of the trials of the Jews in exile come out in the tales of Daniel who was taken from Jerusalem as a child after the city first became subjected to Babylon. Daniel's role as an often influential foreigner spanned more than half a century from Nebuchadnezzar to the Persian king Cyrus.



HEN Nebuchadnezzar, the king of Babylon, besieged Jerusalem in the third


year of the reign of Jehoiakim, king of Judah, he carried away some of the vessels of the house of God. He carried them to the land of Shinar, to the house of his gods.

Then the king of Babylon told Ashpenaz, the master of his household to choose certain of the children of Israel, of the king's family, and of the princes, children who had no fault and were handsome and bright and quick to learn, who had ability to understand science and were worthy to stand in the king's palace. To these they would teach the wisdom and the language of the Chaldeans.

The king allowed them a daily provision of the king's own food, and of the wine which he drank, to nourish them so that at the end of three years they might stand before him as members of his household.

Now among these were some of the children of Judah: Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah. To all these the master of the household gave new names. He gave Daniel the name of Belteshazzar, to Hananiah the name of Shadrach, to Mishael, Meshach, and to Azariah, Abednego.







But Daniel decided in his heart that he would not pollute himself with the king's meat, which was not the food of the children of Israel, nor with the wine which he drank. Therefore he requested that he might not have to eat it.

Now God had filled the master of the household with love for Daniel. And the master of the household said to him: "I fear my lord the king, who has given orders for your food and drink. For why should he see your face looking paler and more wan than the children who are in your group? If this happens, you will make me endanger my head with the king."

Then Daniel said to Melzar, whom the master of the household had put over Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah:

"Test your servants, please, for ten days. Let them give us peas and beans to eat, and water to drink. Then look at our faces and at the faces of the children who eat of the king's food,

and then deal with your servants according to what you find."

He agreed to test them in this manner, and tried them for ten days. After the ten days, their faces appeared fairer and plumper than those of the children who had eaten of the king's food.

So Melzar took away their helpings of the meat, and the wine that they were supposed to drink, and gave them peas and beans.

As for the four children, God gave them knowledge and skill in all kinds of learning and wisdom: and Daniel had understanding of all visions and dreams. Now at the end of the time when the king had said they should be brought in, the master of the household took them before Nebuchadnezzar.

The king talked with them, and among them all, none was found like Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah: therefore they stayed before the king.

And in all matters of wisdom and understanding in which the king tested them, he found them ten times better than all the magicians and astrologers that were in his realm.

And Daniel stayed on, even until the first year of the reign of king Cyrus.

### THE STATUE OF GOLD



**EBUCHADNEZZAR** the king made a statue of gold ninety feet high and nine feet

wide. He set it up on the plain of Dura in the province of Babylon. Then Nebuchadnezzar the king sent out word to gather together the princes, the governors, and the captains, the judges, the treasurers, the counsellors and the sheriffs, and all the rulers of the provinces, to come to see the statue.


up. And anyone who does not fall down and worship shall in that same hour be cast into the middle of a burning fiery furnace."



And who is the God who will deliver you out of my hands?"

### THE FIRE LEAVES THE THREE MEN UNHARMED

And Nebuchadnezzar was full of fury, and his face hardened against Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego.

Therefore he spoke and commanded that the furnace should be heated seven times more than usual. And he commanded the most mighty men in his army to bind Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, and to cast them into the burning fiery furnace.

Because the king had instructed that the furnace be made exceedingly hot, the flame of the fire killed the men who led Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego to it. But Shadrach, Meshach and



Abednego, in the midst of the burning, fiery furnace, were unharmed.

Then Nebuchadnezzar the king was stricken with amazement, and he rose up in haste and summoned his counsellors and said: "Did we not cast three men bound into the midst of the fire?"

"True, O king," they answered.

Then the king said:

"I see four men loose, walking in the midst of the fire, and they are unhurt. And the fourth looks like the Son of God."

And Nebuchadnezzar walked up to the mouth of the burning fiery furnace and said: "Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, you servants of the most high God, come out and come here."

Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego walked out of the fire. And all the princes and the captains and governors and the king's counsellors gathered together there and saw these men against whose bodies the fire had no power. Not a hair of their heads was singed, nor were their clothes burned and there was no smell of fire upon them.

Then Nebuchadnezzar spoke and said:

"Blessed be the God of Shadrach.

Meshach and Abednego, who has sent his angel and saved his servants who trusted in him, and who defied the king's word and risked their lives that they might not serve or worship any god except their own God.

"Therefore I make a decree: Any people, nation or group which says anything against the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, shall be cut in pieces and its houses shall be made a rubbish heap; for there is no other god who can save in this way."

Then the king promoted Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego to high offices in the province of Babylon.

# THE WRITING ON THE WALL

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PON the death of Nebuchadnezzar, his son Belshazzar became king. Belshaz-

zar gave a great feast for a thousand of his lords and drank wine before the thousand.

They brought the golden vessels that had been taken out of the temple of the house of God, and his princes, his wives, and the other women drank from them. They drank wine and they praised the gods of gold, of silver, of brass, of iron, of wood and of stone.

Within the same hour there appeared the fingers of a man's hand, writing upon the wall of the king's palace; and the king saw part of the hand that wrote.

Then the king's face changed, and his thoughts troubled him so that the joints of his legs were loose and his knees knocked together.

The king cried aloud to bring in the astrologers, the Chaldeans, and the soothsayers, and the king said to these wise men of Babylon:

Then Daniel was brought in before the king, and the king said to Daniel:


"Are you that Daniel who is one of the children of the captivity of Judah, whom the king my father brought out of the land of the Jews? I have heard of you, that the spirit of the gods is in you, and that light and understanding and excellent wisdom are found in you.

"Now the wise men and astrologers have been brought in before me to read this writing and tell me the meaning of it, but they could not interpret it for me. I have heard of you, and that you can give interpretations and clear meanings.

#### DANIEL INTERPRETS THE WRITING

Then Daniel answered and said to the king:

"O king, the most high God gave



Nebuchadnezzar, your father, a kingdom and majesty and glory and honour. And because of the majesty that he gave him, all people, nations and languages trembled and feared him. But when his heart was lifted up and his mind hardened in pride, his kingly throne was taken from him; and his glory was taken from him, until he knew that the most high God ruled in the kingdom of men, and that he chooses whomever he wishes to rule over it.

"And you his son, O Belshazzar, have not kept your heart simple, though you knew all this, but you have lifted yourself up against the Lord of Heaven. They have brought you the vessels of his house, and you and your lords, your wives, and other women have drunk wine in them, and you have praised the gods of silver and gold, of brass, iron, wood and stone, which do not see, nor hear, nor know. And the God in whose hands your breath of life is, and whose ways should be yours, him you have not praised.

"This hand then was sent from him and the writing was written by his hand. And this is the writing that was written:

"MENE, MENE, TEKEL, UPHARSIN.

"And this is the meaning of the thing. MENE: God has judged your kingdom and finished it. TEKEL: you have been weighed in the scales and found lacking. UPHARSIN: your kingdom will be divided and given to the Medes and the Persians."

Then Belshazzar commanded that they clothe Daniel in scarlet and put a chain of gold about his neck. And he made a proclamation saying that he was to be the third ruler in the kingdom.

That night Belshazzar, the king of the Chaldeans, was killed. And Darius the Median took his kingdom, being about sixty-two years old.

## DANIEL IN THE LIONS' DEN

T pleased Darius to set over the kingdom a hundred and twenty princes who

were to rule the whole kingdom. And over these were three presidents, and of them Daniel was the first. The princes were to give account to them, so that the king would have no troubles.

Daniel was put over the presidents and princes because of his excellent mind. And the king planned to put him over the whole kingdom. Then the presidents and princes tried to find some fault with Daniel concerning the kingdom, but they could find no fault, because he was faithful and loyal, and there was no error or fault to be found in him. And these men said:

"We shall not find any grounds for complaint against Daniel unless it concerns his worship of his God."

So those presidents and princes assembled together before the king and said to him:

"King Darius, live for ever! All the presidents of the kingdom and

the governors and the princes, the counsellors and the captains, have consulted together about establishing a royal law, by a firm order, that whoever asks anything of any god or man for thirty days, except of you, O king, shall be cast into a den of lions.

"Now, O king, establish this order, and sign the writing, that it may not be changed, according to the law of the Medes and the Persians, which does not change."

Then king Darius signed his name to the writing.

When Daniel knew that the law was signed and ratified, he went into his house, and his windows being open in his chamber facing Jerusalem, he kneeled down three times a day and prayed and gave thanks to his God just

Then the men came together and found Daniel praying and entreating God. They hurried to the king and reminded him of his order.

"Did you not sign an order that any man asking a favour of any god or man within thirty days, except yourself, O king, shall be thrown into the den of lions?

The king answered and said:

"That is true, according to the law of the Medes and the Persians, which does not change."

Then they answered and said to the king: "That Daniel who is one of the children of the captivity of Judah, does not respect you, O king, nor the decree which you have signed, but makes his request three times a day."

When he heard these words, the king was very much displeased with himself, and he set his heart on saving Daniel. He thought until the setting of the sun about how to save Daniel.

Then the men came before the king and said to him: "Remember, O king, that it is the law of the Medes and the Persians that no order or law which the king lays down can be changed."

Then the king commanded them to



found on him, because he believed in his God.

Then the king gave commands, and they brought the men who had accused Daniel, and they cast them into the den of lions, and their children and their wives as well. And the lions broke all their bones into pieces.

Then king Darius wrote to all people and nations, and in all the languages of the earth:

"Peace be multiplied to you! I now command that in every part of my kingdom men tremble and fear before the God of Daniel, for he is the living God, unchanging for ever, and his kingdom shall never be destroyed, and his power shall continue to the end. He rescues and saves, and he works signs and wonders in heaven and on earth, he who has saved Daniel from the power of the lions."

So Daniel prospered in the reign of Darius, and in the reign of Cyrus the Persian.

## PROPHETS OF THE EXILE

The Bible has little additional information on the seventy years between the destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonian armies and the rebuilding of the temple there under the Persians. However a general picture emerges of the Jews continuing to practise their religion in distant regions, spurred on by prophets preaching the eventual return to the holy city. One such prophet was the priest Ezekiel who lived and wrote in Babylon.



T came to pass in the twelfth year of our captivity, in the tenth month, in the fifth

day of the month, that one who had escaped from Jerusalem, came to Ezekiel and said:

"The city has fallen."

Then the word of the Lord came to Ezekiel, saving:

"As a shepherd seeks out his flock in the days, so will I seek out my people, and will bring them from all the places where they have been scattered in the cloudy and dark day.

"And I will gather them from the countries, and will bring them to their own land, and feed them upon the mountains of Israel by the rivers, and in all the inhabited places of the country.

"I do this not for your sakes, O house of Israel, but for the holy name's sake, which you have profaned among the heathen. I will sprinkle clean water upon you, and you shall be clean. I will put my spirit within you and cause you to follow my statutes, and you shall keep my laws."

In the twenty-fifth year of captivity, in the fourteenth year after the city had fallen, the hand of the Lord was upon Ezekiel. In the visions of God, he brought him into the land of Israel, and set him upon a very high mountain. And behold there was a man whose appearance was the appearance of brass.

And the man said to him:

"Behold with your eyes all that I show you. Tell all that you see to the house of Israel."

So the spirit took Ezekiel up and brought him into the inner court of the temple, and the glory of the Lord filled the house. Then Ezekiel heard the man speaking to him from the house, while the man stood by him. He said:

"Here is the place of my throne and the place of the soles of my feet, where I will dwell in the midst of the children of Israel for ever. And they shall no longer defile my holy name, neither they, nor their kings." Ezekiel was deeply aware at all times of the justice and mercy of God.

"If the evil man will turn from the wrongdoing he has committed and keep the statutes of the Lord and do that which is lawful and right, he shall surely live and shall not die. His evil deeds shall not be remembered against him and on account of his righteous acts he shall have life. 'Have I any pleasure that he shall die?' says the Lord. 'Do I not rather rejoice that he shall turn from his wickedness and live?' "

### THE RETURN TO JERUSALEM IS FORETOLD

At the end of the period of exile in Babylon a prophet, whose identity is unknown but who is sometimes called Second Isaiah, since his writings form part of the book of that name, wrote telling the Jews that their banishment was over. Babylon was falling and they would soon be allowed to return to Jerusalem.

O, my people, take comfort, take comfort, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem and cry unto her, that her warfare is ended, for she has received of the Lord's hand double for all her sins. The voice of one that cries in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord.

Make straight in the desert a
highway for our God.

Every valley shall be exalted,

And every mountain and hill shall be
made low;

And the crooked shall be made straight,

And the rough places plain; And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed,

And all flesh shall see it together, For the mouth of the Lord has spoken it."

The voice said, "Cry."

And he said, "What shall I cry?

All flesh is grass,

And all the goodliness thereof is
flower of the field.

The grass withers, the flower fades;

But the word of our God shall stand
for ever."

O Jerusalem, that brings good tidings,

Lift up your voice with strength; Lift it up, be not afraid. Say unto the cities of Judah, "Behold your God!" Behold, the Lord God will come

with a strong hand,
And his arm shall rule for him;
Behold, his reward is with him,
And his work before him.
He shall feed his flock like
a shepherd:

## THE RETURN TO JERUSALEM



OW in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, so that the word of the Lord by the

mouth of Jeremiah might be fulfilled, the Lord stirred up the spirit of Cyrus. And he made a proclamation throughout all his kingdom, and put it also in writing, saying:


"Thus says the king of Persia: The Lord God of heaven has charged me to build him a house at Jerusalem, which is in Judah.

"Who is there among you who are of his people? May his God be with him, and let him go up to Jerusalem, and build the house of the Lord God of Israel in Jerusalem.

"And let each survivor wherever he is living be assisted by the men of that place with silver and gold, with goods and beasts, besides freewill offerings for the house of God in Jerusalem."

Then rose up the chief of the leaders of Judah and Benjamin, and the priests and the Levites, with all those whose spirits God had raised, to go to Jerusalem to build there the house of the Lord.





#### THE TEMPLE IS REBUILT

And now two years after their arrival, all they that were come out of captivity unto Jerusalem set forward

the work on the house of the Lord.

But the adversaries of Judah troubled the people in building, and hired counsellors against them, to stop their progress, all the days of Cyrus king of Persia, even until the reign of Darius king of Persia.

But Darius the king made a decree forbidding any hindrance in the building. And the elders of the Jews built, and finished the temple according to the commandment of Cyrus and Darius, kings of Persia. And the house was finished in the sixth year of the reign of Darius the king.



#### NEHEMIAH ASKS THE KING'S PERMISSION

After these things, in the reign of Artaxerxes king of Persia, there was a royal cupbearer named Nehemiah. One day Nehemiah was in the palace at Shushan when some men of Judah arrived, headed by his kinsman Hanani. And Nehemiah asked them for news of those Jews who had not been taken into captivity, and what had happened to the city of Jerusalem. And they said to him:

"Those who remain in the province

are in pitiful condition. Although the temple is rebuilt, the wall of Jerusalem is broken down and the gates are burned with fire."

When Nehemiah heard this, he wept and mourned for several days, and fasted, praying to God that the sins of his people might be forgiven and that he might be able to help them.

And it came to pass in the twentieth year of Artaxerxes the king, that Nehemiah took up some wine to give to the king. When he did, he could not conceal his sorrow. But he had never before been sorrowful in the king's presence, so the king said:

"Why do you look so sad? You are not sick, so you must have some secret sorrow."

Nehemiah was frightened and said: "May the king live for ever! Why should I not grieve since my home city, the grave of my ancestors, is laid waste and its gates consumed with fire?"

"What are you asking for?" said the king.

Nehemiah prayed to God and said to the king:

"If it pleases the king, and if I

have found favour in your sight, I would pray you to send me to Judah, to the city of my forefathers' tombs, that I may rebuild it."

Then the king, sitting with the queen by his side, asked:

"How long will your journey be? And when will you return?"

Seeing that the king was willing to let him go, Nehemiah set a date for his return and asked for letters of safe conduct to the governors on the other side of the river, so that they would let him travel through to Judah. He asked also for a letter to Asaph the keeper of the king's forest, allowing him to demand timber to make the beams of the gates and the walls.

All of this was granted to him by the king, together with a military escort for the journey.

Nehemiah came to the governors on the other side of the river and gave them the king's letters. When Sanballat the Horonite and Tobiah the Ammonite, who was his servant, heard that he had come to improve the lot of the children of Israel, they were very angry. But Nehemiah went on to Jerusalem and rested there for three days and nights.

One night he arose with a few of his men and without telling anybody of his intentions—for as yet nobody knew what God meant him to do in Jerusalem—he rode out on a donkey and inspected the city.

He went out by the Valley Gate to the Dragon Well and the Dung Gate, and examined the broken walls and burned-out gates of the city. He passed on to the Gate of the Fountain and the King's Pool, but there was no room for the beast that was under him to pass. So he went on in the darkness beside the brook and looked at that part of the wall, and then turned back and went back into the city through the Valley Gate.

#### THE WALL IS REBUILT

The next day, Nehemiah went to the priests and rulers who still did not know why he had come, and he said to them:

"You see what a sad state Jerusalem is in, and how the gates of the city have been burned by fire. Come, let us build up the wall, so that we can hold up our heads again."

He told them of how God had spoken to him, and also of the king's words, and they said:

"Let us rise up and build."

And they began immediately to make their preparations.

When Sanballat the Horonite and

Tobiah the Ammonite and Geshem the Arabian heard what was going to be done, they jeered at Nehemiah and said:

"What are you going to do? Do you propose to rebel against the king?"

Nehemiah answered them, saying: "The God of heaven will prosper us, and therefore we his servants are going to build. But you have no share and no rights in Jerusalem."

The work was shared out and given to the different families and clans. The high priest and his fellow priests rebuilt and sanctified the Sheep Gate. The Gate of the Fountain was repaired by Shallun the ruler of part of Mizpah. Even women helped in the work of rebuilding.

But when Sanballat and Tobiah and the Arabians and the people of Ammon and Ashod heard that the walls of Jerusalem were being rebuilt and the breaches stopped up, they were very angry. So they plotted to come out and fight against Jerusalem in order to stop the work.

Nehemiah heard of this and he set out a watch for them by night and day. Half of his men laboured at the wall, and the other half stood on the alert, armed with spears and shields and bows, and even the builders worked with their swords at their sides. A trumpeter stood by Nehemiah and he gave his orders to the nobles and the rulers and the rest of the people.


"The work is very widespread, and we are separated from each other on the wall, therefore listen for the trumpet, and if it sounds, wherever you may be, run to it. Our God will fight for us."

Thus they went on with the work, and Nehemiah told the people: "Every man with his servant is to lodge inside Jerusalem, to guard us by night as well as working during the day."

Neither he nor his kinsmen nor his servants nor the guards which followed him took off their clothes, except to wash, during the rebuilding of the wall.

And after fifty-two days the wall was finished.





### **PSALMS OF JOY**

I will fear no evil, for thou art with me. Thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies; Thou anointest my head with oil; My cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me All the days of my life, And I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

The Psalms formed the hymn book or service book of the Temple, particularly after the return to Jerusalem. They remain to this day the service book both of Judaism and Christianity. Psalm 126, the last given here, was written as a song of homecoming to celebrate the return of the Jews to Jerusalem.

#### PSALM 23

The Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures:

He leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul.

For his name's sake.

He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death,

The world, and they that dwell therein; For he hath founded it upon the seas, And established it upon the floods. Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? Or who shall stand in the holy place? He shall receive the blessing of the Lord, And righteousness from the God of his salvation. This is the generation of them that seek him, That seek thy face, O Jacob. Lift up your heads, O ve gates, And be ye lifted up, ye everlasting doors. And the king of glory shall come in. Who is this king of glory? The Lord, strong and mighty, The Lord, mighty in battle.

Lift up your heads, O ve gates,

Who is this king of glory?

Even lift them up, ye everlasting doors;

## THE TALE **JONAH**

History in the Old Testament ends with the partial restoration of Jerusalem under the leadership of Ezra and Nehemiah. The Old Testament has practically nothing to say about the period after this, the successive eras of Greek and Roman domination when the Old Testament itself was being assembled in its present form.

Though its date of composition is unknown, one of the final books to be accepted as Holy Scripture in the Hebrew Bible was undoubtedly the story of Jonah, which follows. It is one of the shortest books of the Bible, but it is considered by some to be one of the most profound. Beneath its surface, it tells of God's concern for all people, even the Ninevites, long hated by the Hebrews.

HE word of the Lord came to Jonah, son of Amittai, saying: "Arise and go to

the city of Nineveh, and preach in it, for its wickedness has offended me."

But Jonah fled before the face of the Lord, and he went down to Joppa, where he found a ship which was

each one prayed to his god. And they took the cargo and threw it into the sea to lighten the ship. Jonah was deep inside the ship where he lay fast asleep. So the shipmaster came to him and said: "What do you mean, O sleeper? Arise, call on your God, and if he wills, it may be that we will not perish." Then the sailors said to each other: "Come let us cast lots, that we may know who is the cause of this evil which has come upon us." bound for Tarshish, in the opposite direction from Nineveh. So he paid his passage and went down into the ship to go to Tarshish, in order to escape the presence of the Lord. But the Lord sent a great wind out on the sea, and a mighty tempest arose and the ship was in danger of being wrecked. The sailors were afraid and



So they cast lots, and the lot fell upon Jonah. And they said to him: "Tell us, we pray you, why this evil has befallen us? What is your occupation? Where do you come from? What is your country and your people?" "I am a Hebrew," Jonah said to

"I am a Hebrew," Jonah said to them. "I worship the Lord, the God of heaven, who has made the sea and the dry land."

But Jonah also admitted that he had fled from his God, and then the sailors were exceedingly afraid and they said to him: "Why have you done this? What shall we do to you, in order to calm the sea?"

"Take me up," said Jonah, "and cast me forth into the sea, and it will be calm for you. I know that it is for my sake that this great tempest is upon you."

Nevertheless the men rowed hard to bring the ship to land. But they could not, for the waves were great and the wind was strong against them. Therefore they cried to the Lord: "We beseech you, O Lord, we beseech you not to let us perish for the sake of this man, and do not hold us responsible for an innocent death, since you, O Lord, have done everything according to your will."

Then they took Jonah and threw him into the sea. And the sea stopped its raging. And the men were struck with fear of the Lord, so they offered a sacrifice and made vows to the Lord.


Now the Lord had made ready a great fish to swallow Jonah, and Jonah was in the belly of the fish for three days and three nights. During this time he prayed to the Lord, and at last the Lord spoke to the fish, and it vomited Jonah out on the dry land.

Then the word of the Lord came to Jonah for the second time, saying: "Arise, go to Nineveh, that great city, and preach there the preaching that I tell you."

So Jonah arose and went to Nineveh. according to the word of the Lord. When he reached the city, he walked about in it for a day, and cried: "In forty days Nineveh will be overthrown."

So the people of Nineveh believed in God, and proclaimed a fast and dressed themselves in sackcloth, from the greatest to the very least of them.


Word came to the king of Nineveh, and he rose from his throne and took off his robe, and clothed himself in sackcloth and sat among ashes. And he caused a decree of the king and his nobles to be proclaimed and published throughout Nineveh, saying: "Let neither man nor beast, oxen nor sheep, taste anything. Let them neither eat



covered with sackcloth and let them cry to the Lord with all their might. Let each one turn from his evil way, and from all violence. Who can tell if God may not turn and repent, and

we shall not perish?"

God saw their deeds and how they had abandoned their evil ways, and he repented of the evil that he had said he would do to them. He did it not.



#### GOD ANSWERS JONAH'S ANGER

But Jonah was very displeased and exceedingly angry. He prayed to the Lord, saying: "I pray you, O Lord, did I not say as much when I was still in my own country? That was why I fled from you to Tarshish. For I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger and of great kindness, and repenting of evil. Therefore, now, O Lord, I beg you to take away my life from me: for it is better for me to die than to live."

The Lord answered him: "Is it right of you to be angry?"

So Jonah went out of the city and sat on the east side of it. He made a shelter for himself and sat under it, and there he waited to see what would become of the city.

The Lord God prepared a gourd and made it grow up over Jonah's head to shade him from the noonday sun and ease his grief. So Jonah was very thankful for the gourd.

But early the next morning, God sent a worm which attacked the gourd, so that it withered; and when the sun came up, God sent a violent east wind, and the sun beat down on Jonah's head, and he fainted and longed to die, saying: "It is better for me to die than to live."

Then God said to Jonah: "Is it right for you to be so angry about the gourd?"

Jonah said: "I am quite right to be angry, even unto death."

Then the Lord said to him: "You have had pity on the gourd, though you neither planted it nor tended it; it came up in a night, and it perished in a night.

"Should I not spare Nineveh, that great city, with all its cattle and all its hundred and twenty thousand inhabitants?"

### A VISION OF DAYS TO COME

The idea that the tale of Jonah expresses in story form is stated repeatedly by many of the prophets throughout the Old Testament. This is that God's love is both special and farreaching. It is special in that it is directed towards 'the people of Israel and Judah' with whom God made a covenant at the time of Moses, and far-reaching in that it is not thereby limited to any particular people, time or place.

Its far-reaching qualities are evident in the first of these passages from Micah in which the prophet looks forward to the day of freedom when all nations

shall worship God in peace.

But in the last days, it shall come to pass, that the mountain of the house of the Lord shall be established in the top of the mountains,

And it shall be exalted among the hills and people shall flock into it and many nations shall come, and say,

"Come, and let us go up to the mountains of the Lord and to the house of the God of Jacob.

And he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths."
For the law shall go forth from Zion and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. And he shall judge among many people, and rebuke strong nations afar off; And they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation shall not lift up a sword against nation And they shall not learn war any more.

The special qualities of God's love are clear from the second passage in which first God speaks, then the people of Israel, and finally, in the last verse, Micah himself. Micah's words represent the essence of the prophets' teaching: God requires of his people not sacrifices but lives of justice, kindness and peace.

"O my people, what have I done to you?
And how have I worried you?
Give evidence against me.
I brought you out of the land of Egypt,
and redeemed you from slavery
and set before you Moses
and Aaron and Miriam."

"With what shall we come before the Lord? and bow ourselves before the high God? Shall we come before him with burnt offerings, with calves of a year old?"

"He has shown you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justly, and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God?"




And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying:

"Arise, and take the young child and his mother, and flee into Egypt, and stay there until I bring you word. For Herod will seek the child to destroy him."



HE third day there was a marriage in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus



T came to pass on a certain day, as he was teaching, that there were Pharisees


and doctors of the law sitting by, who had come out of every town of Galilee, and Judea, and Jerusalem. And the power of the Lord was present to heal them.

being in the place.

Afterwards, Jesus found him in the temple, and said to him, "Behold, you are well. Sin no more, lest a worse thing come to you." The man departed, and told the priests that it was Jesus who had healed him. And therefore the authorities persecuted Jesus, and tried to slay him, because he had done these things on the sabbath day.



Jesus said to him, "Rise, take up your bed, and walk." And immediately the man was made healthy, and took up his bed, and walked.

Now that day was the sabbath. Therefore the Jews said to him that was cured, "It is the sabbath day. It

But Jesus answered them, "My Father is for ever at work, and so am I." Therefore his enemies tried even more to kill him, because he not only had broken the sabbath, but said also that God was his Father, making himself equal with God.

#### THE TWELVE APOSTLES ARE CHOSEN

And it came to pass in those days that he went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God. And when it was day, he called to him his disciples, and of them he chose twelve, whom he also named apostles. And he gave to them power to cast out unclean spirits, and to heal all kinds of sickness and all disease.

Now the names of the twelve apostles are these: The first, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother; James the son of Zebedee and John his brother; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the publican; James the son of Alpheus and Lebbeus, whose surname was Thaddeus; Simon the Canaanite; and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.



And he came down with them, and stood in the plain, with the company of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea and Jerusalem, and from the sea coast of Tyre and Sidon, which came to hear him and to be healed from their diseases. And they that were troubled with unclean spirits were healed. And the whole multitude tried to touch him, for goodness went forth from him and healed every one of them.

# THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT



ND seeing the multitudes, he went up into a mountain. And when he had found

a suitable place, his disciples came to him, and he opened his mouth and taught them saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God. Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad, for great is your reward in heaven, for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you.





"You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt has lost its flavour, how shall it be salty again? It is then fit for nothing but to be thrown out and trodden underfoot.

"You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden.

"Men do not light a candle and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick, where it gives light to all that are in the house.

"Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven.

#### THE LAW AND THE PROPHETS

"Do not think that I have come to destroy the old law or the prophets. I have not come to destroy but to fulfil. For truly I say to you, till heaven and earth pass away, not one dotting of an 'i' nor crossing of a 't' will be removed from the law until all is fulfilled.

"Therefore whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches men to do so, shall be called the lowest of all in the kingdom of heaven. For I say to you that unless your goodness excels that of the scribes and the Pharisees, you shall never enter the kingdom of heaven.

"You have heard it said by men in the days of old, 'You shall not kill, and whoever kills shall be in danger of punishment.' But I say to you that whoever is angry with his brother without cause will be in danger of punishment by God. And whoever curses his brother shall be in danger of hell fire.

"Therefore, if you bring your offering to the altar, and there remember that your brother has any grievance against you, leave your offering there before the altar, and go and be first reconciled to your brother, and then come and make your offering.

"Agree with your adversary quickly while you are on the way to court with him, lest at any time the adversary deliver you to the judge, and the judge deliver you to the officer, and you be cast into prison. Truly I say to you, you shall never come out of there, till you have paid the last penny.

"Again, you have heard that it has been said by men of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform as you swear in your oaths.' But I say to you, swear not at all, neither by heaven, for it is God's throne, nor by earth, for it is his footstool; neither by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Nor shall you swear by your head, because you cannot make one hair white or black. But let what you have to say be simply 'Yes' or 'No,' for whatever is more than these comes from evil.

"You have heard that it has been said, 'An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, do not resist an injury. Whoever strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him also the other. If any man wants to sue you for your coat, let him have your cloak as well, and whoever compels you to go one mile, go with him two. Give to him that asks, and if anyone wishes to borrow from you, do not turn away.

#### THE LOVE OF ENEMIES

"You have heard that it has been said, 'You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, love your enemies, bless those who

curse you, do good to those who hate you, and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be the children of your Father in heaven. For he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good alike, and sends his rain on the just and on the unjust.

"For if you love those who love you, what reward do you deserve? Do not even tax-collectors do the same? And if you greet your brothers only, what do you do more than others? Do not even tax-collectors do so? Be therefore perfect, even as your Father who is in heaven is perfect."

"Take care that you do not do your good deeds before men, to be seen by them. Otherwise you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven. When you give charity, do not sound a trumpet before yourself as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, to have the praise of men. Truly I say to you, they have their reward in that. But when you give alms, let not your left hand know what your right hand does, so that your charity may be in secret. And your Father who sees what you do in secret shall reward you openly.



#### THE LORD'S PRAYER

"And when you pray, you shall not be as the hypocrites are, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the corners of the streets, so that they may be seen by men. Truly I say to you: that is their reward. But you, when you pray, go into your room and when you have shut the door, pray to your Father who is unseen. And your Father who sees that which is in secret shall reward you openly.

"And when you pray, do not use idle phrases as the heathen do, for they think they shall be heard for their many words. Therefore do not be like them, for your Father knows everything you need, before you ask him. In this manner therefore pray:

"Our Father who art in heaven,
Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done on earth,
as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our debts,
as we forgive our debtors,
And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil:
For thine is the kingdom, and the power,
and the glory, for ever. Amen.





"For if you forgive men their offences, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their offences, neither will your Father forgive your offences.

"Moreover, when you fast, do not look sad like the hypocrites. For they disfigure their faces so that they may appear to fast. Truly I say to you, they have their reward. But you, when you fast, anoint your head, and wash your face, so that you do not appear to fast to men, but to your Father. And your Father who sees that which is in secret shall reward you openly.

#### TREASURE IN HEAVEN

"Do not collect for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust do damage, and where thieves break through and steal. But collect for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust do damage, and where thieves do not break through and steal. For where your treasure is, there will be your heart also.

"The lamp of the body is the eye. If therefore your eye is sound, your whole body shall be full of light. But if your eye is evil, your whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in you is darkness, how great is that darkness!

"No man can serve two masters, for either he will hate one and love the other, or else he will stand by one and despise the other. You cannot work for both God and worldly wealth. Therefore I say to you, do not worry about your well-being, what you shall eat, or what you shall drink, nor about your body and what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?

"Behold the fowls of the air. They sow not, nor do they reap, nor gather into barns. Yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much better than they? Which of you by taking thought can add one minute to his fe? And why do you worry about dothing? Consider the lilies of the feld and how they grow. They do not work, nor do they spin. And yet I say you that even Solomon in all his glory was not dressed like one of these. Therefore, if God so clothes the grass of

the field, which today grows and tomorrow is cast into the oven, shall he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith?

"Therefore do not worry saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'With what shall we be clothed?', for your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But seek first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well. Take therefore no thought for tomorrow, for tomorrow shall take care of itself. The troubles of today are enough for today.

"Judge not, that you be not judged. For by what judgment you make, you shall be judged, and with what measure you give, so shall you be measured. Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, 'Let me pull out the speck from your eye,' when, behold, there is a log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first cast out the log from your own eye, and then you shall see clearly to cast out the speck from your brother's eye.



"Do not give that which is holy to the dogs, nor cast your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and attack you.

"Ask, and it shall be given you. Seek, and you shall find. Knock, and it shall be opened to you. For every one that asks receives, and he that seeks finds, and to him that knocks it shall be opened. What man is there among you who, if his son asks bread, will give him a stone? Or if he ask a fish, will give him a serpent?

#### THE GOLDEN RULE

"If you then, being evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more shall your Father who is in heaven give good things to them that ask him? Therefore, whatever you want that men should do to you, do so to them. For this is the law and the prophets.

"Enter in at the narrow gate, for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in that way. Because narrow is the gate, and narrow is the way which leads to life, and there are few that find it.

#### BY THEIR FRUITS...

"Beware of false prophets which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly are ravenous wolves. You shall know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes from thorns, or figs from thistles? Every good tree brings forth good fruit, but a bad tree brings forth bad fruit. A good tree cannot bring forth bad fruit, nor can a bad tree bring forth good fruit. Every tree that does not bring forth good fruit is cut down, and cast into the fire. Therefore, by their fruits you shall know them.



"Not everyone that says to me, Lord, Lord,' shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he shall that does the will of my Father who is in heaven. Many will say to me that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in your name, and in your name cast out devils, and in your name done many wonderful works?" And then I will say to them, 'I never knew you. Depart from me, you that practise evil.'

"Therefore, whoever hears these sayings of mine, and does them, I will liken to a wise man who built his house upon a rock. The rain came

down, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, but it did not fall, for it was founded upon a rock. And every one that hears these sayings of mine and does them not, shall be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand. And the rain came down, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell. And great was the fall of it."

And it came to pass, when Jesus had ended these sayings, the people were astonished at his doctrine. For he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes.



## THE MINISTRY OF JESUS **CONTINUES**



OW when he had ended all his sayings in the audience of the people, he entered

into Capernaum. There a certain centurion had a servant who was dear to him, who was sick and ready to die. And when he heard of Jesus, he sent to him the elders of the Jews, begging him to come and heal his servant. When the elders came to Jesus they spoke to him saying, "He deserves that you should do this, for he loves our nation and he has built us a synagogue."


Then Jesus went with them, and when he was not far from the house, the centurion sent friends to him, saying, "Lord, do not trouble yourself, for I am not worthy that you should enter my house, nor have I thought myself worthy to come to you. 
JESUS HEALS THE WIDOW'S SON


When the messengers of John had departed, he began to speak to the people concerning John:

"What did you go into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? What did you go out to discover? Behold, they who are gorgeously

This is he of whom it is written: 'Behold, I send my messenger who shall prepare your way before you.' For I say to you, among those that are born of women there is not a greater prophet than John the Baptist. But he that is least in the kingdom of God is greater than he.

"To what therefore shall I compare the men of this generation? What are they like? They are like children sitting in the market place, and calling to one another and saying, 'We have piped for you, and you have not danced; we cried for you, and you have not wept.' For John the Baptist came neither eating bread nor drinking wine, and you say, 'He has a devil.' The Son of man has come eating and drinking, and you say, 'Behold, a gluttonous man and a drunkard, a friend of publicans and sinners.'"





# JESUS PREACHES ON FORGIVENESS



HE scribes and the Pharisees brought to him a woman caught doing wrong, and

when they had placed her before him, they said, "Master, this woman was caught doing wrong, in the very act. Now Moses in the law commanded that such a person should be stoned. But what do you say?" This they said to test him, that they might be able to accuse him.

Jesus stooped down and with his finger wrote on the ground as though he had not heard them. When they continued asking him, he stood up and said to them, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her." And again he stooped down and wrote on the ground.

When they heard it, they went away one by one, beginning with the eldest, and Jesus was left alone, except for the woman. Then Jesus stood up and seeing no one but the woman said to her, "Woman, where are your accusers? Has no man condemned you?" She said, "No man, Lord." And Jesus said to her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and sin no more."

One of the Pharisees asked Jesus to eat with him. And he went into the Pharisee's house and sat down to dinner. Now there was a woman in the

city who was a sinner, and when she learned that Jesus was having dinner at the Pharisee's house, she brought an alabaster box of ointment and stayed at his feet, behind him, weeping. She began to wash his feet with tears, and wipe them with the hair of her head, and kissed his feet and anointed them with ointment.

When the Pharisee who had invited him saw this, he said to himself, "This man, if he were a prophet, would have known who and what kind of woman this is who touches him, for she is a sinner." Jesus answering said to him, "Simon, I have something to say to you." And he said, "Master, speak on."

"There was a certain creditor which had two debtors. One owed him much, and the other a little. When they had nothing to pay, he forgave them both freely. Tell me then, which of them will love him most?"


"I suppose the one to whom he forgave the most," Simon said. And Jesus said to him, "You have judged rightly." Then turning to the woman, he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I came into your house, and you gave me no water for my feet, but she has washed my feet with tears and wiped them with the hairs of her head. You gave me no kiss, but this woman, since the moment I came in, has not stopped kissing my feet. You did not anoint my head with oil, but this woman has anointed my feet with ointment.

"Therefore, I say to you, her sins, which are many, are forgiven, for she loved much. But he to whom little is forgiven, loves little."

And he said to her, "Your sins are forgiven."

Then they that sat at dinner with him began to say within themselves, "Who is this that forgives sins also?"

And he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you. Go in peace."



Then a man possessed with a devil, blind and dumb, was brought, and Jesus healed him so that he both spoke and saw. And all the people were amazed and said, "Is this not the Son of David?" But when the Pharisees heard it, they said, "This fellow casts out devils only through Beelzebub the prince of the devils."

Jesus knew their thoughts and said to them: "Every kingdom divided against itself is brought to ruin, and every city or house divided against itself cannot stand. If Satan casts out Satan, he is divided against himself. How then shall his kingdom stand?

"If I cast out devils through Beelzebub, through whom do your children cast them out? Therefore, they shall be your judges. But if I cast out devils through the spirit of God, then the kingdom of God has come to you. Or else, how can one enter a strong man's house and plunder his goods, unless he first tie up the strong man? Then he will plunder his house. He that is not with me is against me, and he that does not gather with me scatters.



"Therefore I say to you, all manner of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven men, but blasphemy against the Holy Spirit shall not be forgiven men. Whoever speaks a word against the Son of man shall be forgiven, but whoever speaks against the Holy Spirit shall not be forgiven, neither in this world nor in the world to come. Every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account of in the day of judgment. For by your words you shall be justified, and by your words you shall be condemned."

Then certain of the scribes and Pharisees said, "Master, we wish to see a sign from you." But he answered:

"An evil and indulgent generation seeks a sign, but there shall be no sign given to it except the sign of the prophet Jonah: As Jonah was three days and three nights in the whale's belly, so shall the Son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth."

### JESUS PREACHES IN PARABLES

T came to pass that he went throughout every village and city, preaching and

showing the glad tidings of the kingdom of God. The twelve apostles were with him, and certain women which had been healed of evil spirits and sicknesses: Mary called Magdalene, out of whom went seven devils, and Joanna the wife of Chuza, Herod's steward, and Susanna, and many others, who cared for him out of their means.

By the seaside, great multitudes were gathered together about him, so he went into a boat and addressed the multitude who stood on the shore.

#### THE SOWER

And he spoke many things to them in parables, saying:

"A sower went out to sow his seed. And as he sowed, some fell by the wayside, and the fowls came and ate them up. Some fell on stony places where they had not much earth. And when the sun rose they were scorched, and because they had no root, they withered away. And some fell among

the others I speak in parables, that seeing they still may not see, and hearing they still may not understand. Now the meaning of the parable is this:

"The seed is the word of God. Those by the wayside are they who hear. Then the devil comes and takes away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe and be saved."

Those on the rock are they who, when they hear, receive the word with

joy, and having no roots, they believe for a while, but in time of temptation fall away.

"Those which fell among thorns are they who, when they have heard, go forth and are choked with the cares and riches and pleasures of this life, so that their faith never ripens.


"But the seed on the good ground are they who, with honest and good hearts, having heard the word, keep it and bring forth fruit with patience."

And when he had said these things, he cried, "He that has ears to hear, let him hear." Then his disciples asked him, saying, "What does this parable mean?" And he said:

"To you is given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God, but to





#### THE GRAIN OF MUSTARD SEED

He put forth another parable to them, saying:

"The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed, which a man took and sowed in the field. It is indeed the least of all seeds, but when it is grown it is the greatest among plants, and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and build nests in its branches."



#### THE TARES

Another parable he gave to them, saying:

"The kingdom of heaven is like a man who sowed good seed in his field, but while he slept, his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat, and went his way. So when the blades sprang up and brought forth fruit, the tares appeared also.

"So the servants of the man came and said to him, 'Did you not sow good seed in the field? From where then have come the tares?"

"'An enemy has done this,' he said to them, and the servants asked, 'Do you wish then that we go and gather them up?' But he said, 'No, lest while you gather up the tares, you root up the wheat with them also. Let both grow together until the harvest, and in the time of harvest, I will say to the reapers, "Gather together first the tares and bind them in bundles to burn them. But gather the wheat into my barn." "

#### THE MEANING OF THE TARES

All these things Jesus spoke to the multitude in parables. He did not speak to them without a parable, so that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet, saying:

"I will open my mouth in parables. I will utter things which have been kept secret since the foundation of the world."

Then Jesus sent the multitude away and went into a house, and his disciples came to him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the tares of the field."

And when they were alone together, he answered:

"He that sows the good seed is the Son of man. The field is the world; the good seed are the children of the kingdom. But the tares are the children of the wicked one. The enemy that sowed them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the world; the reapers are the angels. Therefore, as the

tares are gathered and burned in the fire, so shall it be at the end of the world.

"The Son of man shall send forth his angels, and they shall gather out of his kingdom all things that offend, and those who do evil, and they shall throw them into a furnace of fire. There shall be a wailing and a gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous shall shine forth like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Who has ears to hear, let him hear."

#### THE NET OF FISH

"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was cast into the sea and gathered all kinds of fish. When it was full, they drew it to shore and sat down and put the good into vessels, but cast the bad away.

"So it shall be at the end of the world. The angels shall come forth and separate the wicked from the just and shall cast them into the furnace."



### JESUS IN NAZARETH



HEN Jesus had finished these parables, he departed and went into his own

country, to Nazareth where he had been brought up. And as his custom was he went into the synagogue on the sabbath day, and stood up to read. The book of the prophet Isaiah was given to him, and when he opened the book he found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach the gospel of the poor.

"He has sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, and to preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

He closed the book and gave it back to the minister and sat down. And the eyes of all them that were in the synagogue were fastened on him. And he began to say to them, "Today this Scripture is fulfilled in your ears."



But he, passing through the midst of them, went his way.



Now it came to pass on a certain day that he went into a boat with his disciples, and said to them, "Let us go over to the other side of the lake." So they set sail. But as they sailed, he fell asleep, and there came down a storm of wind on the lake, and the boat was filled with water, so that they were in danger. The disciples awoke him saying, "Master, Master, we are sinking."


Then Jesus arose and rebuked the wind and the raging of the water, and

they ceased and there was a calm. And he said to the disciples, "Where is your faith?"

They were frightened, and wondered at this, saying to one another, "What manner of man is this? For he commands even the winds and the water and they obey him."

And they came to the other side of the lake, into the country of the Gadarenes. When Jesus stepped forth on the land, he met a certain man who had had devils a long time, and wore no clothes, nor lived in any house, but had his dwelling among the tombs.





When the man saw Jesus, he cried out, and fell down before him, and with a loud voice said, "What have I done to you, Jesus, Son of God most high? I beg you, do not torment me." (For Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man, for often it had seized him, and though he had been kept bound with chains and in fetters, he broke the bonds and was driven by the devil into the wilderness).

"What is your name?" Jesus asked him. And he said, "Legion," because many devils were within him. And he begged Jesus not to command them to go out of the country.

Now there was a herd of many swine feeding on the mountain, and he begged him to let them enter into the swine. He allowed them, and the devils went out of the man and entered into the swine, and the herd ran violently down a steep slope into the lake, and were drowned.

When they that fed the swine saw what was done, they fled, and went and told it in the city and in the country. Then people went out to see what was done. They came to Jesus and found the man, out of whom the devils had departed, sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed, and in his right mind. And they were afraid.

Those who had seen it told them by what means he that was possessed of the devils was healed. Peter answered him and said, "Lord, if it is you, let me come to you on the water."



#### THE TRANSFIGURATION



Then Jesus answered and said, "O faithless and perverse generation, how long shall I be with you? How long shall I bear you? Bring him here to me." And Jesus rebuked the devil, and he departed out of him, and the child was cured from that very hour.

Then the disciples came to Jesus privately and said, "Why could we not cast it out?" And Jesus said to them, "Because of your unbelief. For truly I say to you, if you have faith as small as a grain of mustard seed, you shall say to this mountain, 'Move hence to yonder place,' and it shall move, and nothing shall be impossible to you. However, this happens only by prayer and fasting."

They departed and passed through Galilee, and Jesus taught his disciples, saying, "The Son of man shall be delivered into the hands of men, and they shall kill him, and after he is killed, he shall rise the third day." But they did not understand his words, and were afraid to ask him.

And he came to Capernaum, and in a house he asked them, "What was it you disputed among yourselves on the way?" But they held their silence, since on the way they had disputed among themselves about who should be the greatest.

Then Jesus sat down and called the twelve, and said to them, "If any man desires to be first, he must be last of all, and servant of all." And he took a child and placed him in the midst of them and, taking him in his arms, he said, "Whoever shall receive

"And if your hand offends you, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life maimed than to have two hands to go into hell, into the fire that shall never be put out. And if your foot causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter lame into life than having two feet to be cast into hell. And if your eye offends you, pluck it out. It is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than having two eyes to be cast into hell.

"Moreover, if your brother trespasses against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he shall hear you, you have gained your brother. But if he will not hear you, then take with you one or two witnesses, so that every word may be established. And if he will not hear them, tell it to the church. But if he refuses to hear the church, let him be like a heathen and a publican to you.

"I say to you that if two of you agree on earth concerning anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them by my Father who is in heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

# THE PARABLE OF THE UNMERCIFUL SERVANT

Then Peter came to him and said, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Up to seven times?"

Jesus said to him, "I say to you, not seven times, but seventy times seven.

"Thus the kingdom of heaven is like a certain king who had a servant that owed him ten thousand talents. Because he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, and his wife and children and all that he had, and payment be made. The servant there-

fore fell down and worshipped him, saying, 'Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay you all.' Then the lord of that servant was moved with compassion and freed him and forgave him the debt.

"But the same servant went out and found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred pence, and he laid hands on him, and took him by the throat, saying, 'Pay me what you owe.' And his fellow servant fell down at his feet and begged him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you all.' And he would not, but went and cast him into prison, till he should pay the debt.

"So when his fellow servants saw what was done, they were very sorry, and came and told to their lord all that was done.

"Then his lord, after calling him forth, said to him, 'O wicked servant, I forgave you all that debt, because you begged me. Should you not also have had compassion on your fellow servant, even as I had pity on you?' And his lord was angered and delivered him to the torturers, till he should pay all that was due to him. So likewise shall my heavenly Father do also to you, if you do not forgive from your hearts your brothers' trespasses."

It came to pass that when Jesus had finished these sayings, he departed from Galilee and came into the coasts of Judea beyond the Jordan. And great multitudes followed him, and he healed them there.

As he went along the road, a certain man said to him, "Lord I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of man has nowhere to lay his head."

"Go your ways. Behold, I send you forth as lambs among wolves. Carry neither purse, nor money, nor shoes, and salute no man along the way. And into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house.'

"And remain in the same house, eating and drinking such things as they give, for the labourer is worthy of his hire. Do not go from house to house.

"Into whatever city you enter, and they receive you, eat such things as are set before you, and heal the sick that are therein, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is near.' But whatever city you enter that receives you not, go your ways out into the streets of the same, and say, 'Even the very dust of your city, which clings to us, we wipe off against you. Nevertheless, be sure of this, that the kingdom of God is near.' But I say to you that it shall be more tolerable in that day for Sodom than for that city.

"He that hears you, hears me, and he that despises you, despises me, and he that despises me, despises him that




### THE GOOD SAMARITAN

"And they began to be merry.



"But Abraham said, 'Son, remember



that he may warn them, lest they also come into this place of torment.'

"Abraham said to him, 'They have Moses and the prophets, let them listen to them.' And he said, 'No, father Abraham, but if one went to them from the dead, they would repent.'

"And Abraham said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, they will not be persuaded; even though one rises from the dead.'"




# JESUS PREPARES THE DISCIPLES

"Then he said to his servants, The wedding is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy. Go therefore into the highways, and as many as you shall find, invite them to the marriage."


"So those servants went out into the highways and gathered together as many as they found, both bad and good, and the wedding was furnished with guests.

### THE END OF TIME


"The sun shall be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light, and the stars shall fall from heaven, and the powers of the heavens shall be shaken.

### THE DAY OF JUDGMENT




But they said:
